No Use For Fishermen To Send Petition.

The Mayor announced last night that so far as he was concerned, even if the fishermen did petition for the withdrawal of opposition to the Cow Bay exchange of property he would stick to his guns and hold out for the rights of the city in that property. It was also suggested that the Provincial Government should go ahead and build the floats on the Grand Trunk property without any assurance that they would get the property eventually.

If anyone asked the city to do anything like that Mayor McClymont would be among the first to reject it. He is Scotchman enough for that and if Mr. Pattullo were to sanction a scheme of the kind both he and Alderman McMeekin and Alderman McRae would certainly have something to say.

The News is holding no brief for the Government in this matter nor for the Grand Trunk Pacific. Its viewpoint in this matter is entirely selfish. If the city goes ahead the News along with other business institutions should benefit, and nothing will help the city to go ahead so much as catering to the needs of the fishermen. They have been sadly neglected in the past and it is matter for congratulation that the Provincial Government has decided to do what it can, even though the action of the Council, no matter for what reason, makes it impossible for the whole work to be completed.

Peace Time Activity Is Already Commencing.

The announcement yesterday that arrangements had been made to go ahead with a general woodworking business at the wooden shipyard building at the drydock, is the first intimation of peace activity. Mr. Buckley had been considering the proposal for some time but it was only on Saturday that he was able to say that he had secured the ship shed and plant and could make an announcement regarding what he intended to do.

Today we are able to make a further announcement regarding a proposal to erect a pulp mill on Masset Inlet, the two capitalists Stuart Cameron and J. L. Davidson being behind it. This, it is generally admitted, is a splendid scheme and one that should prove permanent and beneficial. How far advanced the plans are we do not know, but if it matures it will be greatly to the advantage of this city.

Two Firms Were After Ship Shed.

It is interesting to note in connection with the taking of the ship shed by Mr. Buckley for woodworking purposes, that had he not taken it there was another firm ready to step in and use it for building wooden ships. A representative of the firm was in the city for several days last week and only went south on Sunday night. Of the relative value of the two concerns The News has nothing to say. The drydock belongs to the railway company and they can lease it to whom they wish. The interesting thing to Prince Rupert people is the fact that the outfit is in demand and that outsiders recognize the value of Prince Rupert as an industrial centre.

Slowing Down on Victory Loan.

There was a little slowing down on the Victory Loan canvass yesterday, owing to a combination of circumstances. It is very much to be hoped that there will be no slackening because peace has been declared. Money is needed just as much as ever to bring the boys home and to keep them until they are again absorbed into civil life.

As long ago as Friday last Anyox with her 2,000 to 2,500 inhabitants had touched the \$200,000 mark and by now doubtless is far ahead of that. Prince Rupert cannot afford to be beaten by a little mining town.

City Employee Did His Work Well.

No greater thing can be said of a man than that "he did his work well." That is what is said on every hand of the late Jack Morrison. He worked for the city for a number of years and throughout that time he was keenly interested in his work. He did it in the best way he knew.
