King Charles of Austria Quits

SOCIALISTS WANT WILHELM BEFORE ALLIES DISPOSE OF HIM

WHAT SHALL BE DONE WITH WILHELM, EUROPE IS ASKING

ACTION BY POWERS NECESSARY TO INCARCERATE WILHELM IN ISLAND PRISON, OR HAVE HIM STAND CRIMINAL PROCEEDINGS—GERMAN PEOPLE ALSO WANT TO GET HIM

November 13.—The sending of the Kaiser to the island of Elba, or to St. Helena as a prisoner is being widely discussed throughout Great Britain, as is also the fact of his being sent to criminal prosecution, as the result of four different trials by four different juries. It is pointed out by British statesmen here today that either of these courses would be a matter of joint action of the powers interested in the peace terms imposed upon Germany. Absolutely no anxiety is being felt regarding the possibility of Wilhelm ever again interfering with the peace. He is regarded as impotent for further evil, particularly in view of the very drastic terms of the armistice imposed by General Foch and the Allies.

Wanted in Germany.
Washington, November 13.—That the German factions may demand the extradition of their former Kaiser from his haven of Holland so that he may stand his trial before a Socialist court in Berlin is suggested in diplomatic cables received here from Europe. The feeling against Wilhelm is declared to be strong throughout the army and also in Prussia, where such a thing might be least expected. Before a court of German Socialists Wilhelm would stand already condemned, and even at the hands of his own countrymen, who are but now beginning to find out how things really are, the ex-Kaiser would receive short shrift.

WILL OCCUPY LARGE SLICE OF GERMANY

All West of Rhine Will Be Controlled By Allies Until Peace Terms Are Agreed to By Germans.

London, Nov. 13.—Concerning the evacuation of the left bank of the Rhine, it is pointed out that pending the final adjustment of the new boundary between France and Belgium with Germany, the Germans will be required to relinquish control not only of Alsace and Lorraine, the two former French provinces wrest from France after the campaign of 1870, but the remainder of the German provinces which lie west of the Rhine. These provinces include the Rhine-Palatinate, Rhenish Prussia, part of Hesse, and the German state of Luxembourg. Included in these territories are the important cities of Mayence, Coblenz, Bonn and Cologne. These are all large manufacturing cities, and this occu-

KING CHARLES OF AUSTRIA-HUNGARY GIVES UP THRONE

REVOLUTION AND ANARCHY PREVAIL THROUGHOUT THE HETEROGENEOUS HOLY ROMAN EMPIRE—NEW PROVISIONAL GOVERNMENTS ARE HELPLESS

Copenhagen, November 13.—The abdication of King Charles of Austria-Hungary is officially announced from Vienna. The young king and his empress have found their period of rule to be extremely exacting. They have fled from Vienna to one of their estates, where they are living in seclusion, so far as seclusion is possible within the borders of the disrupted Dual Monarchy.

Karl Quits Cold.
Paris, November 13.—The late Emperor Charles of Austria has issued a manifesto declaring that he is forsaking all participation in public affairs of German Austria, as well as in the other portions of his empire.

Austria Seething.
London, November 13.—From reports received here from various parts of Austria-Hungary, the conditions of the population of these countries is desperate. Famine, revolution and anarchy are rife everywhere. The poor are without food and the new provisional governments of the various states into which the two countries are now divided have so far been unable to relieve the situation to any appreciable extent, notwithstanding all their efforts.

New States.
Bohemia, Hungary, the Tyrol, and the Slav provinces have each set up independent governments already, and in Austria proper the people are seething with revolution and no stable order has yet arisen out of the turmoil.

PRINCE RUPERT DISTRICT EXCEEDS ITS ALLOTMENT

Prince Rupert District investments in the Victory Loan totalled \$303,000 up till last night, which makes a showing of \$21,350 for yesterday's canvass. This is fairly satisfactory, and as half of the city or thereabouts has still to be covered, there is every hope that this amount will be very largely increased.

THE MAKING OF MUNITIONS WILL STOP GRADUALLY

Ten Per Cent. of Workers Will be Let Out at a Time—Shipbuilding Continues Uninterruptedly.

Ottawa, Nov. 13.—In planning the cessation of war activities in Canada, while the manufacture of rifles and ammunition will finally stop, there will be no alteration in the Dominion's shipbuilding program for some very considerable time. Very many contracts have been let at the various ports for the construction of new vessels, and there are many vessels still in the stocks under construction sufficient to keep the yards busy for quite a long time.

In the manufacture of munitions, while the demand for rifles and shells at the front has ceased, the output of the munition factories will be lessened gradually. The employees engaged in the production of these articles will be released in lots of ten per cent at a time, which will prevent the labor market from being overcrowded all at one time, and permit of the first numbers being absorbed into other lines of occupation before the succeeding ten per cent are released.

The process will be a gradual one to minimize the disturbance of conditions as much as possible. With the scarcity of labor prevailing at the present time, and continuous demands being made upon Canada's productive capacity for Europe, it is not considered likely that there is much danger of unemployment in Canada.

We have the victory; now let us buy the bonds.

ALLIED PRISONERS IN GERMANY WILL TRAVEL VIA HOLLAND

Paris, Nov. 13.—Holland has consented to carry on the work of repatriating all the Allied prisoners now held captive in Germany. The many thousands of prisoners will be drawn from the various detention camps throughout Germany and sent to their own countries as fast as it is possible. Those who are in good physical condition will naturally be able to travel fastest and will be evacuated first. It is considered that it will take some considerable time to get all the sick and wounded cases moved from the interior of Germany and brought to Holland before they can be dispatched home.

TOTAL OF VICTORY LOAN IS CLIMBING

Toronto, November 13.—The total subscriptions to the Victory Loan 1918 to date amounts to \$367,864,150. Of this total the province of British Columbia has contributed the sum of over \$18,000,000.

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IMPERIAL WAR CABINET TO RESUME SITTINGS

London, November 13.—Reuters Agency learns that the Imperial War Cabinet will shortly resume its sittings in order to deliberate upon the terms of peace. There will also be important conferences and discussions in London between the Imperial and Dominion statesmen.
