In the Letter Box

To the Editor,

Mr. Montgomery and the members of the City Council are still living in the past. Whenever Cow Bay is mentioned they at once return to the days when the city was trying to work out the beginnings of a city. I have not been here more than a year and yet if I say Cow Bay I am at once deluged with a mass of semi-historic fact or fiction all of which I am asked to believe.

Now sir, I know that the local engineer has received orders to proceed with the work and I also know that he was not very keen to give out his information to you. Sizing up all the arguments for and against each scheme I find that it comes down to this: Does the city own Cow Bay or does the Provincial Government own it? If the Government owns it they have a right to exchange it for other property.

I may say that I have inquired about it a good deal from those who ought to know and I can find no record of the city owning any part of it. If that is true they have no rights there.

But, Mr. Editor, I want to go farther than that and say that even if they have a right of way over it, which I very much doubt, that is no excuse for holding up the development scheme which the engineer is about to start. Let that place be tied up for the next few years, as it may probably if the Council stands pat, and the city will lose much more than the cost of a piece of waterfront. The Provincial Government represents the people just as much as the Council does. It represents the visitors here as well as the citizens. If it is willing to shoulder the burden of keeping up the floats, why not let them. That is the stand I take and I think it is reasonable. This other stuff the councillors peddle is just so much election dope, but I don't think it will work. The fishermen know what they want.

It is hoped that it will not be necessary to look after prisoners of war much longer, as one of the first stipulations of the armistice terms is the release of the prisoners. All the same it is a good thing to know that these parcels have been reaching the men regularly, and that the boys have been saved by the food sent by the Red Cross Society.

Many people are under the impression that it will no longer be necessary to do Red Cross work, now that it is hoped peace has come, but there has never been more need of help than at the present time, when the allies in their onward march have released thousands of civilians in these devastated countries. A call has been sent to the Red Cross for all kinds of clothing for these refugees, who must be cared for this winter. In Toronto the Society is already engaged in this work and it is expected that this city will be asked to do the same, as well as continuing to look after the wounded who have been put out of action in recent weeks.
