## MARKET PRICES STILL SHOW AN UPWARD TREND

But, Unlike Europe, Supplies in Canada Are Still Plentiful Although Food Costs More.

Judging by the store window displays as well as by other obvious things, there is no doubt that the winter season is upon us. Christmas and New Year are only a few weeks away, too, according to the calendar, for further proof. The fall soft fruits are now off the market and apples, in good variety, are the mainstay meantime. Another gauge of the season is the price of new laid eggs which today are being offered, and few, too, at that, at 81.10 per doz. Hens ought to be wearing an air of importance these days.

Among the new shipments this week are Australian currants, which are selling at 30c per lb. Hitherto Greece has had the monopoly of this little dried grape but with the scarcity of shipping recently imports from Europe have fallen off. And the Australian growers are seizing their opportunity.

Among the few staples which in price has remained comparatively stationary is coffee, and for the same reason. The South American plantations have been unable to get space for exports to Europe, but with the release of shipping now, and Europe being short, the demand will increase and the price naturally rise.

Malaga grapes are arriving and new comb honey looks good. Oranges are scarce at \$1 a dozen, but in a few weeks should be more plentiful and cheaper, when the navels arrive.
