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

H. R. McMillan Says That Spruce Production is Continuing As Usual.

That the hand loggers' contracts have been terminated by the Imperial Munitions Board is the first intimation received in regard to shutting down on the spruce production in Northern British Columbia. In regard to the others, the work is going on as usual and there is no lessening in the output so far, following the signing of the armistice. That is the message brought by H.R. McMillan who has charge of the spruce production work for Norhern British Columbia.

Mr. McMillan says that had the war continued much longer there would have been a decided shortage of spruce. They found it difficult to keep up the supply of logs as it was, as most of the places where they are operating is practically logged out. There is plenty of other timber, but not aeroplane spruce.
