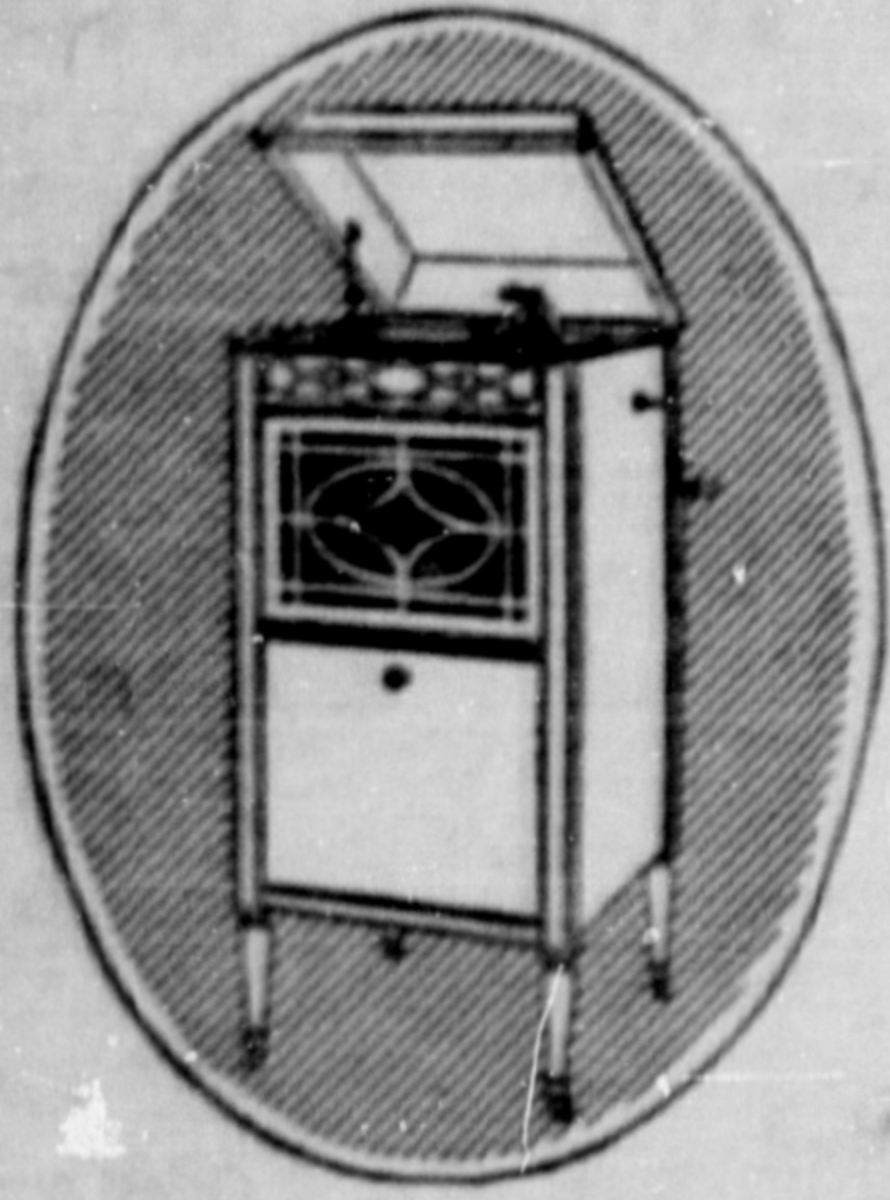

GERMAN SHOT VICTORY LOAN CANVASSER

Party Visited House Late in the Evening to Try to Induce Him To Buy Bonds.

Mails arriving yesterday bring word of the shooting of a Victory Loan canvasser at Drumheller by a German who is supposed to have been formerly an officer in the German army. According to the account received an inquest was held on Wednesday night and the jury returned a verdict that Tip Blaine came to his death by gunshot wounds from a gun fired by Albert Arnold.

The shooting took place at Arnold's farm, which was visited by Blaine, accompanied by five other residents of Drumheller, named Steele, Wilson, Bishop, Hoaglund and Cunningham, who were canvassing the district for purchasers of Victory bonds.

The party had previously visited another German home, neighbors of Arnold, and they had purchased Victory bonds. This neighbor had warned the party about going to visit Arnold, as it was said that he was a bad one.

Enter House After Knocking.

Upon arriving at the Arnold place after dark, the party knocked at the door, and receiving no answer knocked again, and still no answer being made, entered, and opening an inner door, through which they went to Arnold's bedroom. Blaine was leading, having the Union Jack draped over his breast. Suddenly a shot was fired and Blaine fell. Arnold was then heard to shout, "Keep away, I am an expert shot," and immediately three more shots were fired, which scattered the party.

"I Am an Expert."

After the shooting of Blaine, Steel went back and asked if he could see the body of Blaine. Arnold compelled him to come in, his hands above his head, and then made him light a lamp. Arnold examined the body of the murdered man and said, "I guess I killed him. I am an expert with the rifle." He then ordered his guest to leave the premises, saying, "I will be gone in five minutes." Steele did so.

Find Blaine Dead.

After waiting a considerable time longer, the men went back and to make sure that the slayer was no longer in the house they threw rocks through a window. Believing Arnold to be gone, they went in and found Blaine dead, and Arnold nowhere to be seen.

Next morning Sergeant Skelton and Detective McDonald traced Arnold to Delia, where he had already surrendered to J. P. Macbeth, J. P., stating that he had shot a man who entered his house after dark.

It is not believed that Arnold took the Victory Loan salesmen for robbers, owing to the fact that there were seven automobiles in the party, and there was plenty of noise to warn him of their approach. It is stated that Arnold was very sullen and feeling sore over the defeat of Germany.

Tip Blaine leaves a wife and three children, and, so far as is known, Arnold is unmarried and lived on his farm alone.

TAKE NOTICE that application has been made to register Brenton G. Moore and Roy L. Moore of Prince Rupert, B.
