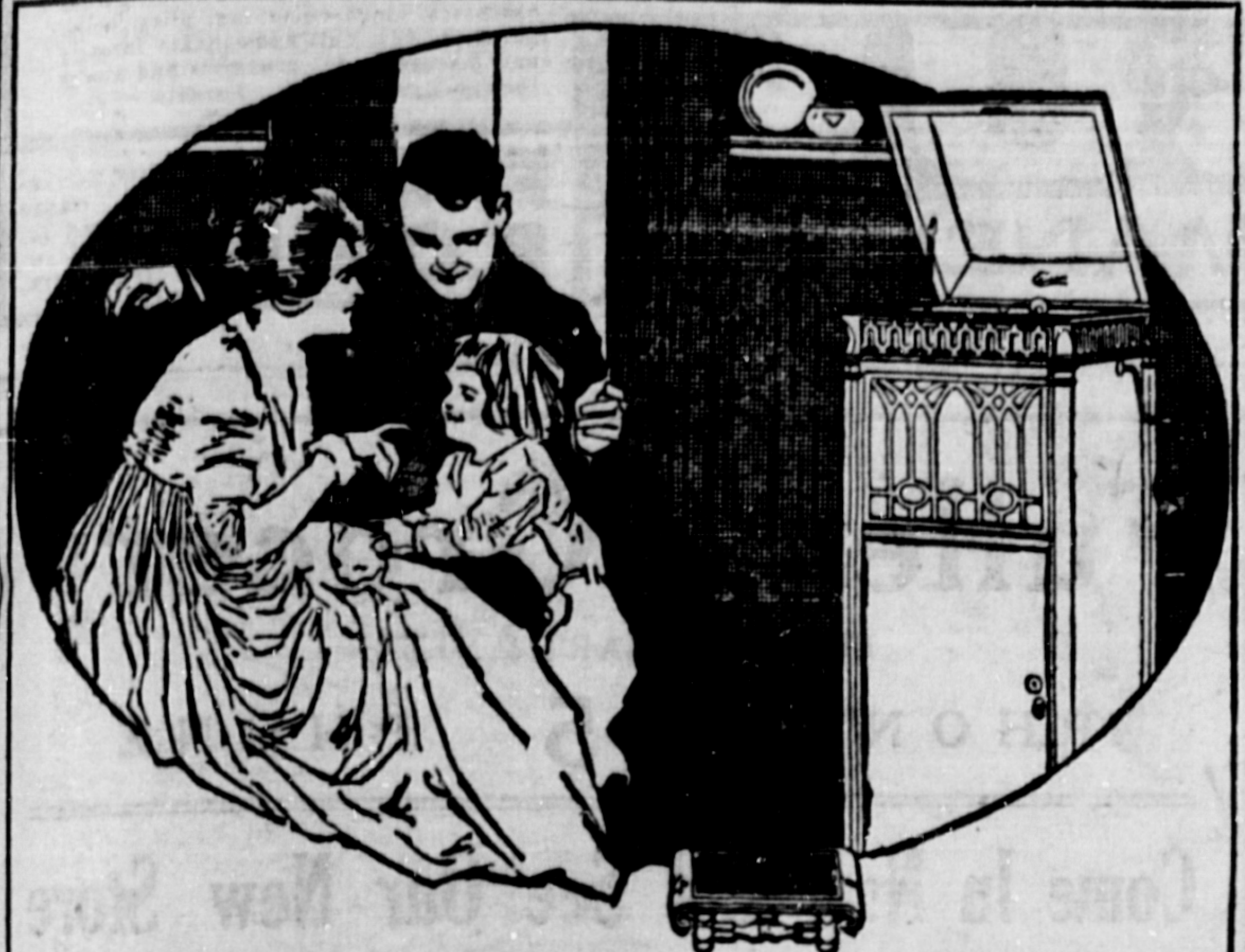

## ICE AND BAIT SHOULD BE PROVIDED AT ONCE FOR THE FISHERMEN

Mayor and Aldermen Discuss Question at Close of Meeting Last Night.

At the conclusion of the general business of the City Council last night Mayor McClymont said he wished to make a statement in regard to the fisheries question. He told of what had been said on the platform to the effect that if private enterprise did not provide the fishermen with ice and bait the municipality should do it.

For the past two years people had been talking of a cold storage. They were able to get sites and power but the proposals always fell flat. A few months ago there was a meeting of citizens and a committee was formed to canvass the possibilities. This also seemed to have fallen down.

Personally the mayor said he was not in favor of going into the cold storage business, for financial reasons, but something might be done in the way of manufacturing ice and providing bait. He thought they should have a municipal wharf where anyone might buy or sell fish and where they could put up bait and ice. The city could finance it by selling bonds as they did for the Victory Loan.

Alderman Dybhavn said that the committee had not yet given up the other scheme but that a meeting would be held this week to finally decide.

Alderman Casey said that nothing had been done by the Council toward developing anything. The time now was ripe for action. If a private concern would undertake it he would be pleased, but even then there might still be something left for the City Council to do. He thought it would be a good thing to appoint a commission to go into the question with the fishermen and tabulate the definite requirements. If they rose to the occasion they might do something. With all the data to hand they would have the confidence of the public who would back them up if they carried it out.

## TELEPHONE CHANGES TO BE RECONSIDERED

Council Will Again Discuss the Matter Before Rates Are Finally Set.

As a result of the efforts of Alderman Kirkpatrick and Alderman Casey the final consideration of the telephone rates bylaw has been set over for a few days in order to give an opportunity for those opposing it to bring forward a rival plan.

Alderman Kirkpatrick objected to the proposed scheme in that it meant an increase on residential telephones of about 62 cents a month, whereas the increase on business phones she claimed was only 12½ cents a month.

Alderman Casey suggested a general increase of 30 cents in order to meet the deficit.

After a good deal of discussion the resolution to delay was passed.

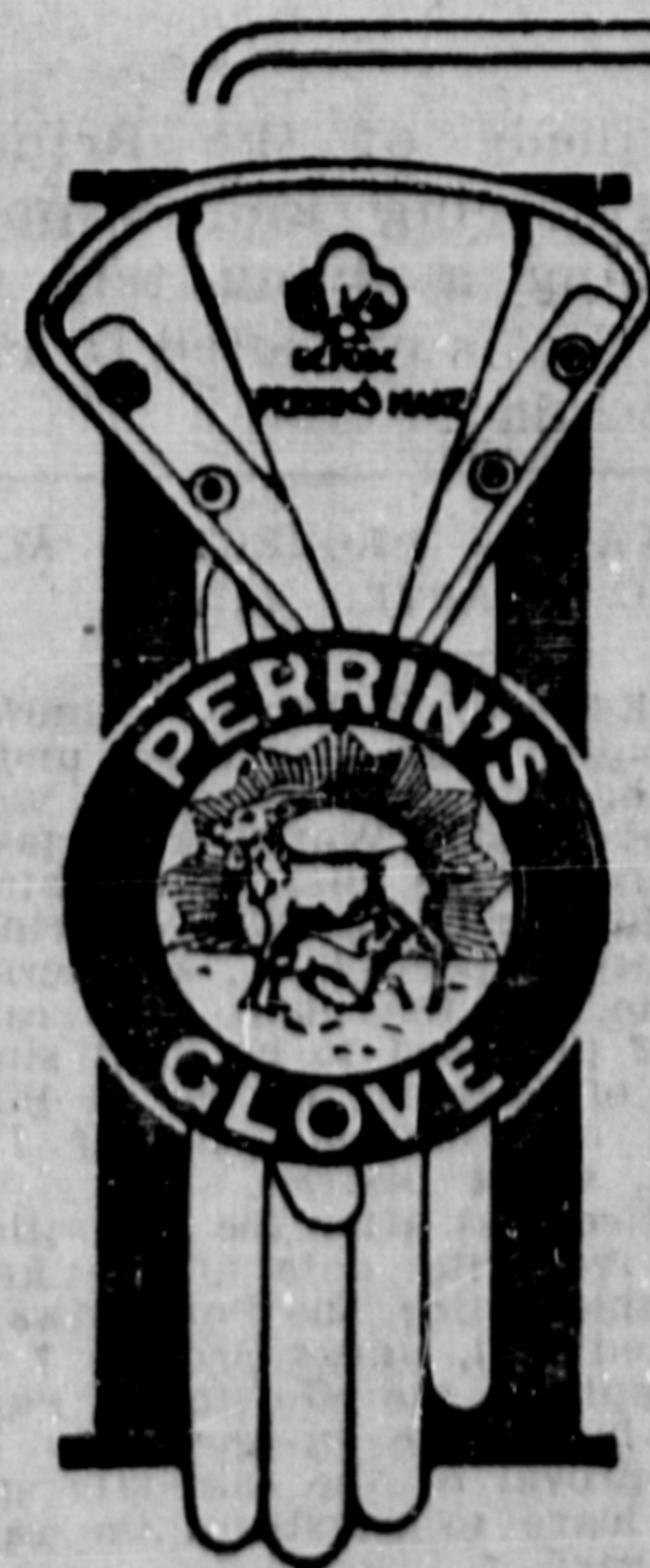
