STRONG OPPOSITION BY BOLSHEVIKI FORCES

Archangel, Nov. 25.—American and Entente forces have encountered strong opposition both on the Vologda-Archangel Railway and on Dunia River. Owing to the swampy condition of the terrain it has been necessary to confine operations to the waterway and railway as the upper part of the river is deeper than at its mouth. Bolshevik craft equipped with large guns have been better able to manoeuvre than Entente ships and have prevented the occupation of Kotlas. The Entente officials fear a great massacre if the Allied troops should withdraw now.

THREE KILLED IN TORONTO COLLISION

Toronto, Nov. 25.—Three persons were instantly killed, one died from injury and two others are in the General Hospital here as a result of a collision between a Grand Trunk train and a motor car at the Queen Street crossing in Brampton, shortly before six o'clock Saturday night. The dead are Edith and James Sawdon, Pearl Belles and Miss Ethel G. Wilson; injured W. and Charles Sawdon.
