FISHERMEN MET CITY COUNCIL

Committee appointed to Wait on Government Engineer to Discuss Uses to Which Floats Would Be Put.

WHOLE PROJECT WILL AGAIN BE DISCUSSED

Opinion Expressed That Aldermanic Board Should Evolve Plan of Improvement For Waterfront.

On a motion from Alderman Dybhavn, Mayor McClymont and Alderman Casey were appointed to act jointly with a committee of the fishermen to wait on the Provincial Government Engineer to discuss with him the uses to which the new docks at Cow Bay are to be put. This was the outcome of a long and at times rather discursive discussion which took place at a meeting of a committee of the whole City Council with a delegation of fishermen following the regular Council meeting last night.

It was also announced that the Council would again take up the whole Cow Bay question and see if it might not be possible to work out a plan which would be acceptable to the Provincial Government and of benefit to all concerned.

There was a good deal of ancient history raked up during the discussion and the attitude of The News came in for some criticism, it being shown that the only information the fishermen had was what was given them by the engineer, and it went to show that their worst fears were confirmed. The plans plainly showed that the new floats were to be used for private leases, for government launches and for private launches. While it may not have been the intention to use the floats for those purposes the plans indicated it and the engineer stood by his plans.

W. H. Montgomery, C. Edwards and Bob Hanna were the chief speakers for the fishermen. Mr. Edwards outlined the position in regard to the floats and Mr. Montgomery substantiated what he said. He also claimed that the Council had never yet shown any clear intention of doing anything with the waterfront land it was asking for, and, therefore, could not expect to get it. He claimed they had a right to make suggestions to the Government who were the custodians of public property. He also claimed that the City should not be allowed to hold up waterfront any more than the Government, but should come forward with a definite scheme in a business-like way and then ask the Government for approval.

In answer to questions from the Mayor and Aldermen the fishermen admitted that the proposed floats would be of great advantage to them, but that they would not accommodate the whole fleet. Many boats, it was pointed out, had gone to Vancouver and Seattle because there was no place to tie up here. If the docks were three times as large as those proposed they would still be filled. The only objection they took to the plans was the prospect of having the places filled by government boats or private leases and there being no place left for the fishermen.

After the passing of the resolution the meeting adjourned on the understanding that their committee would look after the matter.
