PEACE CELEBRATION CLOSED WITH A GREAT GATHERING OF CITIZENS LAST NIGHT

LOYAL AND PATRIOTIC ADDRESSES STRIKE RESPONSIVE
CHORD IN AUDIENCE — ANNOUNCEMENT
MADE THAT RETURNED SOLDIERS'
BUILDING WILL BE ERECTED

A great crowd gathered last evening at the Exhibition Hall to take part in the celebration and to show their appreciation of the work of the men who had gone overseas and attained such wonderful results. A number of fine addresses were delivered, but possibly the most interesting announcement was that made by Captain McNeill in regard to a memorial to those who had fallen. He stated that the War Veterans had asked the city for a piece of land on which to erect a building to be used as a clubhouse for returned men. It was to be an imposing structure and on its walls was to be engraved the roll of honor of those who had gone overseas, those who had been wounded and those who had paid the supreme sacrifice.

The Metlakatla band which led the procession to the hall and which played a number of patriotic selections was well received and added much to the effectiveness and enjoyment of the occasion.

Mayor McClymont presided and in a few well chosen words called the gathering to order and asked Fred Peters, K. C., to give an address on The Navy.

TELEGRAPHERS' STRIKE IN CANADA AND STATES IS QUITE PROBABLE

Chicago, Nov. 28.—A vote favoring a strike of railway telegraphers on all roads in the United States and Canada was cast in Chicago by general chairmen and secretaries of the fifty-one divisions of the Order of Railroad Telegraphers in the western and middle western states. At the Chicago meeting were representatives of 45,000 government employees, who were dissatisfied with the supplement to general order No. 27, affecting wages and working conditions. It was voted to reject all these and telegrams were sent to meetings in other cities, asking similar action.

PROHIBITION ACT IS INFRINGED BY LOCAL RESTAURANT KEEPER

Bottle of Brandy Cashed Beneath
Floor Boards Found by Police
Officer—Opium Charge
Is Also Laid.

WHEN IS A ROOMING HOUSE NOT A ROOMING HOUSE?

Lee Jan appeared at the police court this morning charged with being in possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than specified in the act. The accused pleaded guilty. Constable Bailey while on night duty made this discovery. He found a bottle of brandy cached away between the ceiling and the floor of the Java Cafe on Third Avenue. The magistrate imposed a penalty of \$50 and costs.

The city solicitor asked for a heavier penalty, but Mr. Patmore for the defence considered that it ought to be dealt with as a first offence. Taking into account the sickness which has been prevailing, he was of the opinion that provided every place in town were searched, a bottle would be found in practically every house. The magistrate did not raise the penalty, however, although he was not being governed by what had been done in the past, and warned the accused of the heavier penalty for keeping liquor in a restaurant building.

Another charge against the same party was that he was also in possession of opium, prepared for smoking. The accused pleaded not guilty to this second charge, which was adjourned until next Tuesday.

Miss M. Martin was charged before Magistrate Carps this forenoon with keeping liquor in a place other than that permitted by the Prohibition Act. It was alleged that in a rooming house on Third Avenue, kept by the accused, she had intoxicating liquor. A bottle which she tossed out of the window on the approach of the police was shown in evidence. It was denied that this was a rooming house, and the case was adjourned until next Tuesday.

A discharge paper apparently the property of Stanley Albert Coleman of the 47th Battalion, dated at Victoria, May 15, 1918, was discovered here in a man's bedroom and handed to Sub-Inspector Adams of the Military Police who now holds it awaiting the rightful owner.

Wm. Balagno who went away some time ago to join the Flying Corps, returned yesterday and will again take up his work here as leader of the Westholme orchestra. His work is well known here and his return will be welcomed. The Westholme is also trying to arrange for other additions to the orchestra. TO INSPECT B.C. HERRING

Great Increase in Herring Pack
on B. C. Coast Makes Inspection
of Packing Methods
Necessary.

PRINCE RUPERT MAN RECEIVES APPOINTMENT

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, Nov. 28.—The Department of Naval Service has confirmed the appointment of William Wilson, of Prince Rupert, B. C., to advise and instruct western packers of herring and to inspect and brand their cured product during the coming herring season. The new inspector, who has had thorough training in barrel making and herring curing, will have headquarters at Nanaimo. Up to the present time it was not considered necessary to maintain an inspection officer on the Pacific coast because herring curing here before has been carried on in small way by people having sufficient knowledge of business to enable them to sell their output readily on the strength of their own trademark. Conditions arising from the war, however, have greatly stimulated this branch of the fishing industry in British Columbia and a number of packers who lack the necessary knowledge and experience are being drawn into it. In order, therefore, to protect the reputation of British Columbia herring it is necessary that a system of inspection be established.

Wm. Wilson, who is a returned soldier, left Prince Rupert for his new headquarters several days ago. Born and brought up on the Moray Firth in Scotland, he has followed the fishing business all his life, and his knowledge of the Scotch cure of herring which is proving its superiority to other styles of packing this delicate fish, should be invaluable.

WHALING STEAMER HALCYON IS GONE

Vessel That Figured in Jack London's Famous Story Went Adrift at Aleutian Islands.

Seattle, Nov. 28.—The famous whaling steamer Halcyon which furnished inspiration for Jack London's story of "Sea Wolf" has gone to her end in the far north. She went adrift at Akutan, Aleutian Island, in a big storm on November 14, while the captain and crew were ashore. The Halcyon was built at San Francisco in 1887 and was purchased about two years ago by the North Pacific Sea Products Co. at Seattle.

IS PREPARING FOR COUNTER REVOLUTION

Amsterdam, Nov. 28.—General Von Der Marwitz, former aide de camp to Emperor William and later commander of German forces on the Verdun front, has arrived at Teves with a big army and appears to be preparing for a counter revolution, according to a sensational despatch from Berlin filed there November 21.

EXTRADITION OF FORMER KAISER

Possibility Is Being Considered by Law Officers of Crown in Great Britain.

ALLIES ENTITLED TO TRY HIM FOR CRIMES

Holland Takes View She Has no Power to Surrender Him Without Germany's Consent.

Amsterdam, Nov. 28.—Efforts to secure a statement to the press from the late Kaiser failed. The late Emperor is in constant touch with the German embassy at The Hague.

London, Nov. 28.—It is understood that the question of extradition of the former German Emperor is being considered by British law officers of the Crown, who are working in close co-operation with French authorities. Action was taken immediately after the flight of the former Emperor to Holland.

The Evening News says it understands the law officers have concluded that the Allies are entitled to demand the extradition of the former Emperor and that this applies also to individuals who have committed or given instructions for the commission of extraditable crimes.

It is added that Holland takes the view that she has not power to surrender such persons without the consent of Germany.
