

SPLENDID WORK OF COL. PECK AT VIMY RIDGE

Marched to Victory With Piper
Playing By His Side, Says
Famous Correspondent.

SEEMED TO BEAR A CHARMED LIFE

Carried Off Field After Collapse,
But Was Soon Back Doing
Greater Things.

"Canada's latest V.C., Lieut.-Colonel Peck, is one of the wonder men of the war," declared F. A. McKenzie, war correspondent of the Montreal Star, who is now in Montreal, where he will open a cross-Dominion lecture tour next Sunday.

Mr. McKenzie's further reference to the gallant soldier is interesting and appreciative: "Lieut.-Colonel Peck does not look a hero," said Mr. McKenzie, "and the popular novelist would pass him over. Middle-aged, comfortably built with a friendly, quiet and leisurely air about him, one thinks of him at first meeting as more suited for a comfortable club chair and a good cigar. Yet this leisurely-built man has a record second to none. He is head of one of the most famous Highland Battalions of the Canadian Corps, a battalion of heroes, and his men worship him and would follow him anywhere.

"He walks into battle with a piper by his side, skirling the pipes to the full. Somehow he happens to get where the fighting is thickest in place of staying in battalion headquarters, where his proper place is. And where he goes things happen. He may look leisurely off duty, but he is a nippy man in the hour of action. You cannot keep him out of a fight.

This was proved at Vimy. He was very ill just before April 9, the famous day when the Canadians took the ridge. He ought to have been in bed, away down at the base, but when his battalion went over, there was the Colonel with it, with his piper playing by his side. Wounded men raised themselves up on their elbows to cheer him. He kept on hour after hour through the beating rain and snow, struggling through shell holes, bearing a charmed life, and when his men reached their objectives he was there.

"He saw that everything was right, helped to beat off a German counter attack, and then when darkness came on collapsed. Even his iron will could carry him no further. He stumbled and fell and had to be carried off the field. By all the laws of medicine he ought to have died that day, but he is one of the tough kind that take a lot of killing.

"I saw him a week later in a London hospital.

"He did too much that day," some one told me. "His soldiering days are over." But the Colonel was back in the field a short time later, and has done greater things since than ever before.

"Colonel Peck is particularly proud of Richardson, the regimental piper, who, when the battalion became entangled in uncut wire in a daring advance at the Somme, walked to and fro in front of the wires, playing his pipes, while German machine bullets were whistling and shells bursting all around, and the place was a shambles of death. When at last the Highlanders, or what was left of them, forced their way through Richardson marched with them, still playing, until they reached and captured a German trench. Here a shell struck and killed him."
