**NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS**

SEALED TENDERS, superscribed "Tender for Cow Bay Launch Harbor Protection Work," will be received by the Honorable the Minister of Public Works up to 12 o'clock noon of Tuesday, the 10th day of December, 1918, for the erection and completion of pile dolphins, floats, etc., at Prince Rupert, B. C. (in the Electoral district of Prince Rupert).

Plans, Specifications, Contract, and Forms of Tender may be seen on and after the 25th day of November, 1918, at Office of the Public Works Engineer, Parliament Buildings, Victoria, B. C., District Engineer's Office, Court House, Vancouver, B. C., and the office of J. H. McMullin, Govt. Agent, Prince Rupert, B. C.

Each proposal must be accompanied by an accepted bank cheque or certificate of deposit on a chartered bank of Canada, made payable to the Honorable the Minister of Public Works, for a sum equal to 20% of tender, which shall be forfeited if the party tendering decline to enter into contract when called upon to do so, or if he fails to complete the work contracted for. The cheques or certificates of deposit of unsuccessful tenderers will be returned to them upon the execution of the contract.

Tenders will not be considered unless made out on the forms supplied, signed with the actual signature of the tenderer, and enclosed in the envelopes furnished, accepted.

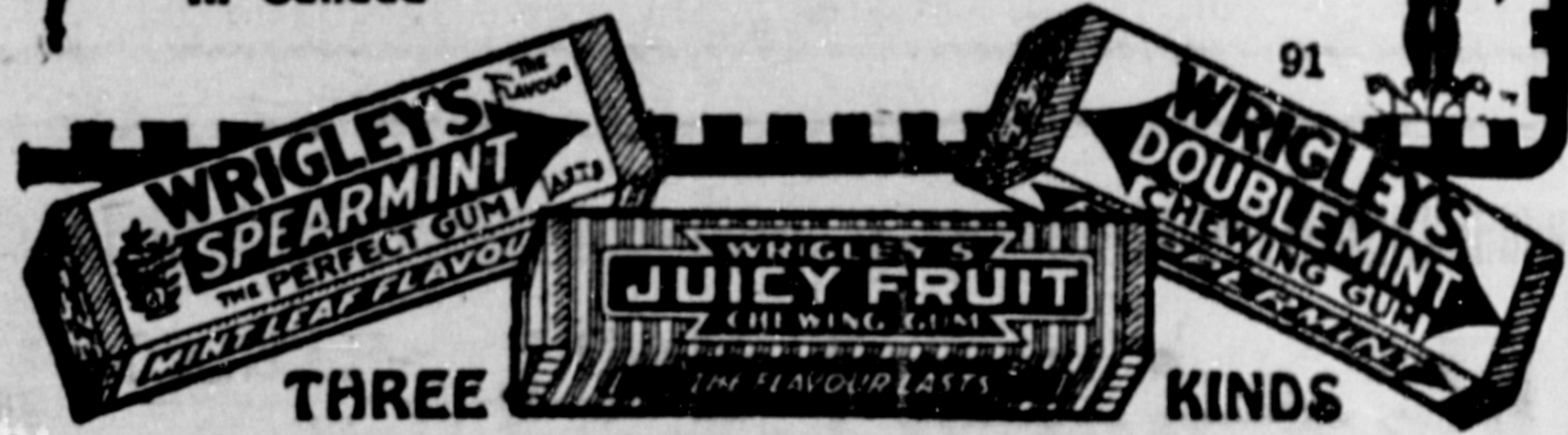
