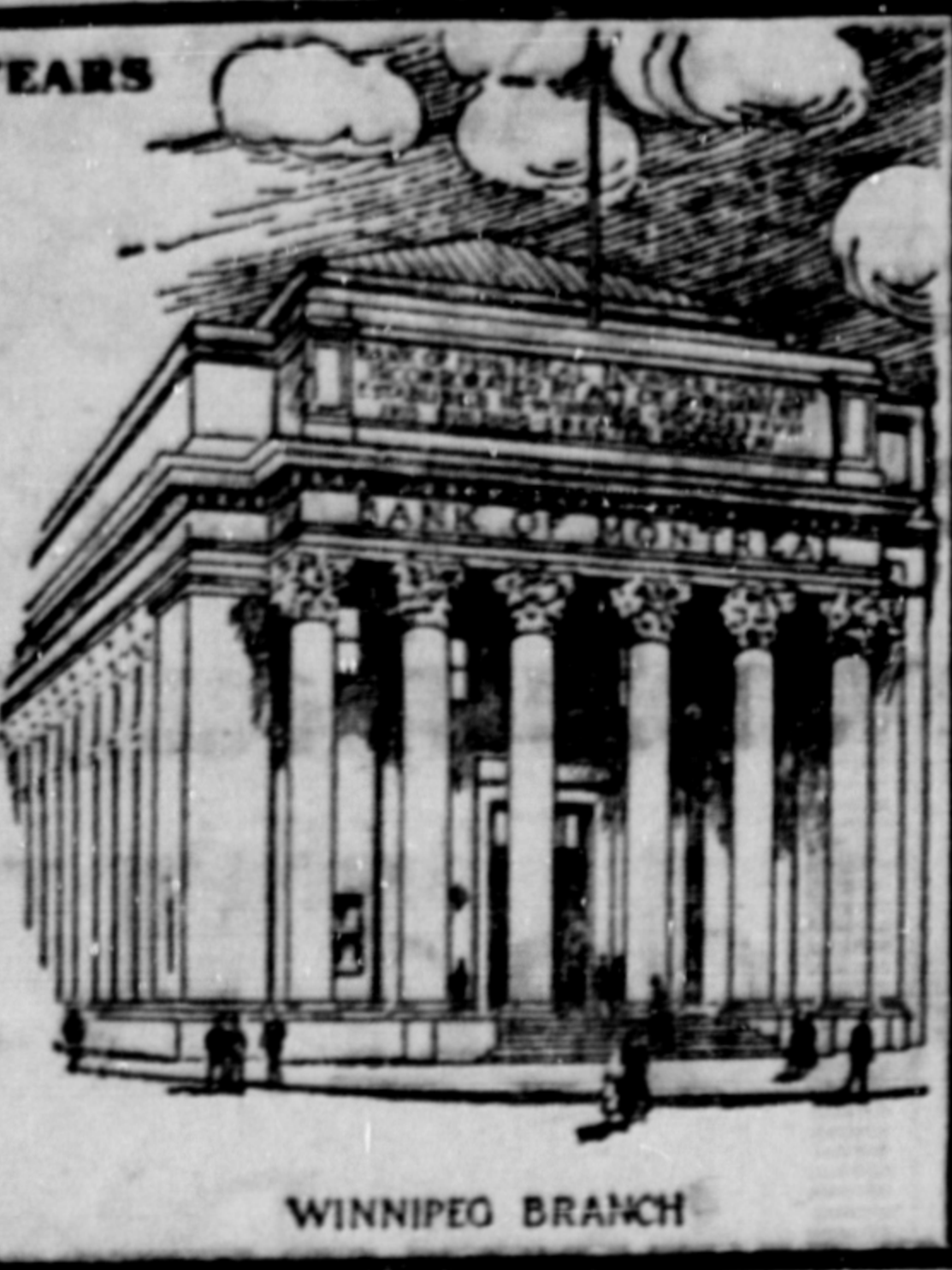

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS

SEALED TENDERS, superscribed "Tender for Cow Bay Launch Harbor Protection Work," will be received by the Honorable the Minister of Public Works up to 12 o'clock noon of Tuesday, the tenth day of December, 1918, for the erection and completion of pile dolphins, boats, etc., at Prince Rupert, B.C., (in the Electoral district of Prince Rupert).

Plans, Specifications, Contract, and Forms of Tender may be seen on and after the 25th day of November, 1918, at Office of the Public Works Engineer, Parliament Buildings, Victoria, B.C., District Engineer's Office, Court House, Vancouver, B.C., and the office of J. H. McMullin, Govt. Agent, Prince Rupert, B.C.

Each proposal must be accompanied by an accepted bank cheque or certificate of deposit on a chartered bank of Canada, made payable to the Honorable the Minister of Public Works, for a sum equal to 20% of tender, which shall be forfeited if the party tendering declines to enter into contract when called upon to do so, or if he fails to complete the work contracted for. The cheques or certificates of deposit of successful tenderers will be returned to them upon the execution of the contract.

Tenders will not be considered unless made out on the forms supplied, signed with the actual signature of the tenderer, and enclosed in the envelopes furnished, accepted.

Red Cross Notes

The Red Cross Society makes a special appeal for help for another year. They have pledged themselves to help look after the Siberian Expedition, and the clothing and housing of the refugees of the devastated countries.

As the proceeds of the Friday sales will be given to this worthy object, the public is earnestly asked for their support in a cause which must appeal to all. The sooner these people are rehoused and reclothed, conditions of food will improve for the Allies, as until this work is accomplished the ban on food will not be removed.

Mrs. C. W. Poole who has worked so faithfully at the Tuesday sewing meetings in the Baptist Church rooms, has arranged for Mrs. J. S. Carmichael and Mrs. Spencer to look after this work for December and January. Much work is on hand for Siberia and all who can are asked to attend these Tuesday afternoon meetings.

At the monthly business meeting of the Society last Saturday votes of thanks were passed to Mrs. Lord, Mrs. Carruthers and Mrs. F. R. Alexander who supplied about 80 lbs. of meat for broth for "flu" patients. George Sutherland of McBride St., also supplied a duck. Mr. Lindsay of the Cartage Company, was also thanked for supplying a motor truck for use of the Red Cross in the peace parade.

Since the 1st of October, the following supplies have been received: Seal Cove, 22 pairs of socks; Namu, 10 pairs of socks and 10 pairs of pyjamas; Stewart, 12 pairs of socks; Port Simpson 22 pairs; Sandspit, 12 pairs, and Sunnyside Cannery, 3 pairs of socks.

During the recent "flu" epidemic, 70 suits of pyjamas were supplied to the Borden Street Emergency Hospital.

Mrs. Moxley and Mrs. Oliver Rogers will be in charge of the Red Cross sale in the hut on 3rd Ave. next Friday.

The sale last Friday realized \$42.90. Included in this amount is a cheque from Captain Hoopes Freeman for \$40, for which he is thanked.

TWENTY DRYDOCKS ARE BEING BUILT LIKE THE ONE HERE

W. T. Donnelly the Designer of the Rupert Floating Dock, is Busy With Many Others.

The way business is going in the United States is well illustrated by the fact that W. T. Donnelly who designed the local drydock has in hand the building of no less than twenty more like it. They are all of the same type and are for use in different ports of the United States.

The fact that the same type of dock is now being used so generally to replace the old fashioned graving dock is a satisfactory indication that Prince Rupert is right up to date in the matter of her equipment.

The people of Vancouver Island have been trying to get the Dominion Government to build a big graving dock and it seemed as if they would succeed at one time. Now, however, it is practically certain that when a dock is built there it will be a floating dock such as the one here.

W. T. Donnelly is a marine engineer with headquarters at New York and his work is purely that of designing and giving a general oversight to see that the docks conform to the plans which he draws.

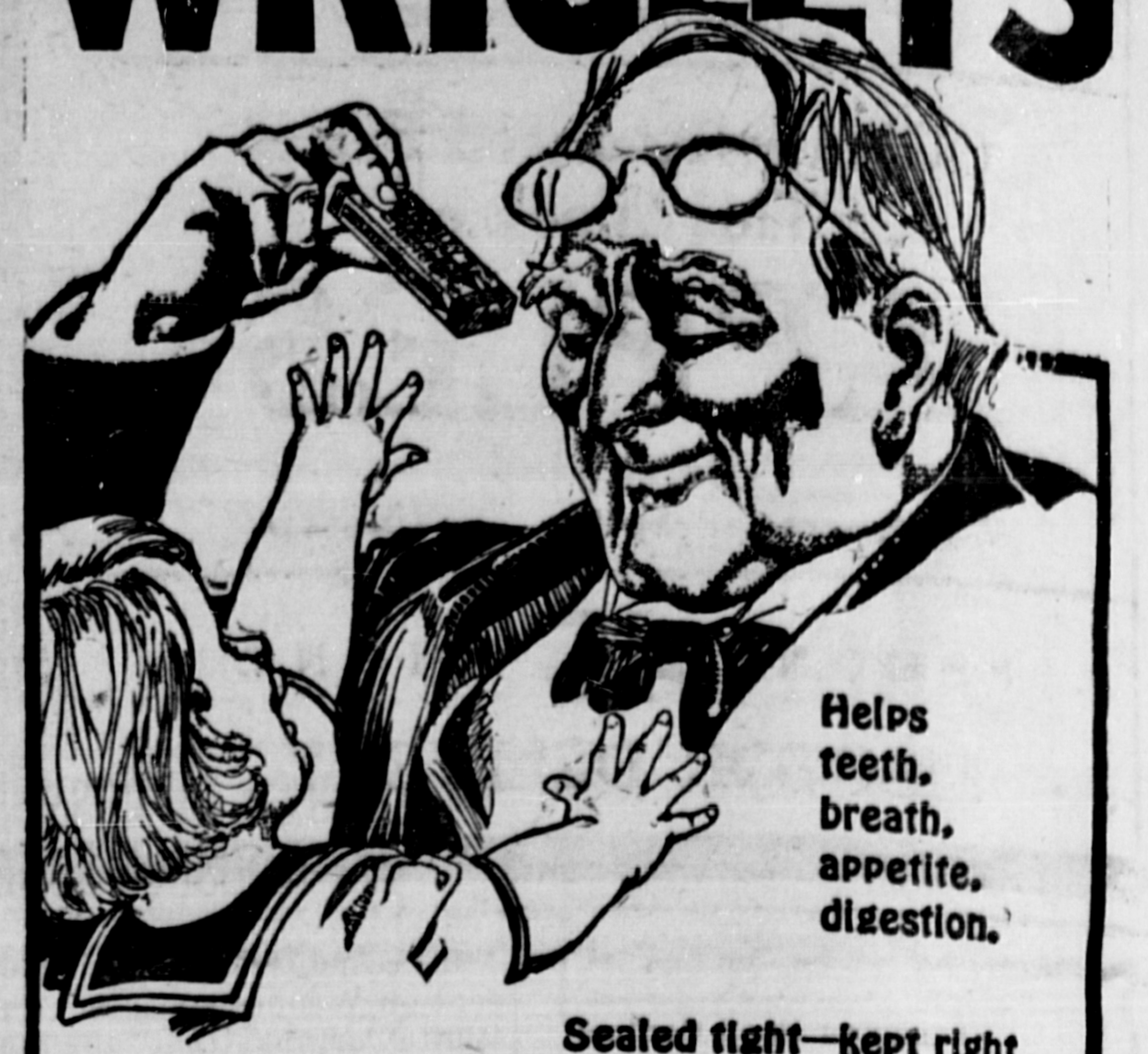
