"THE CONQUEROR" IS A WONDERFUL DRAMA

A great story of Tennessee is "The Conqueror," the play in which William Farnum is appearing at the Westholme tonight. It is a story of love and struggle. The climb to the position of constable, of sheriff, of governor and then of the repulse of the girl he had loved is one that thrills. Then came the final battle in Texas where the two men fight for the girl, and Sam Houston, the hero of the play, finally wins both the fight and the girl.

It is a curious drama, full of action and different from any other. It gives Farnum an opportunity to display his wonderful talents as an actor.

WILL THERE BE LOSS ON HOUSING SCHEME?

In response to his telegram sent on Wednesday to Sir Thomas White urging that the federal government accept the principle that it will be responsible for any losses arising out of the proposed national housing scheme where it involves the provision of homes for returned men and their dependents, Premier Oliver received the following from Sir Thomas: "If better housing plans are properly carried out there should be no loss. Suitable land bought at today's low prices should become more valuable in the future, and any depreciation of buildings should be more than provided for by amortization payments. The Province or Municipality which will have control of administration should bear any loss which might possibly occur, as they will be the beneficiaries of the plan through improved local industrial conditions. The municipality will also have the benefit of increased taxable property. The Dominion Government is making a very substantial contribution in the rate of interest at which it offers money to Provincial Governments as our loans cost us more than five and a half per cent."

It is Premier Oliver's contention that the province should share responsibility only in cases other than returned men, any losses incurred in the case of these latter falling upon the federal government under the scheme whereby the Dominion will make loans to the provinces to be re-loaned to the municipalities, although upon the provinces rests the responsibility for repayment and for any losses incurred.
