## PREMIER OLIVER DISCUSSES POLICY OF GOVERNMENT AND DEFENDS HIS OWN ACTIONS

PUBLIC UTILITIES MEASURE TO BE PASSED AT NEXT SESSION OF LEGISLATURE—SETTLEMENT ENCOURAGED BY ACTION OF LAND SETTLEMENT BOARD

Premier Oliver at the opening of the new Liberal headquarters in Vancouver was given a fine reception. He spoke on a wide range of subjects and took occasion to answer criticisms, especially with reference to the Pacific Great Eastern Railway and the suggestions of Mr. Bowser for a select legislative committee to enquire into the matter of the equipment. He was ready at any place, any time, to be investigated, would welcome it and assist in any way in his power, the Premier said. He informed the gathering, furthermore, that he had gone to his honor, the Lieutenant-Governor, and so stated to him.

Problems of reconstruction, returned soldiers, land settlement, labor and capital, railway construction, and matters of the past and the future, were touched upon in turn by Hon. Mr. Oliver, who took the occasion also to make reference to the old provincial regime in words anything but complimentary. In fact, a portion of his speech was reminiscent of the last provincial campaign.

Three other ministers—Hon. J. W. deB. Farris, attorney-general and minister of labor; Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, and Hon. E. D. Barrow, minister of agriculture, also spoke, though briefly compared to the leader.

A resolution of confidence in Hon. Mr. Oliver, as Premier and leader of the Liberal party, and in the ministers, was passed unanimously. Mr. J. H. Falconer, president, occupied the chair, Mrs. Ralph Smith, M. A. Macdonald and J. S. Cowper, members of the Legislature, and many prominent figures in the Liberal ranks, including Joseph Martin, were noticed in the crowd which filled the dining room of the Citizen's Club and loudly applauded the ministers at intervals.

**Defended Government.**  
Hon. Mr. Oliver launched himself on a defence of his government, and an answer to criticism. With relation to the land policy, he said that as the Liberals had for years opposed the policy of the late government "on the grounds of corrupt administration and inefficiency," the people had a right to ask him what the present government had done.

The late government, he said, had alienated the public lands, and the people had put upon him and his cabinet a duty to reclaim the land from speculators who held it, and he described the manner of the working of the land settlement machinery.

True, he said, not a great deal of progress had yet been made, but one result had been that land which the speculator had held at a high price was now offering at half of what the speculator wanted before. The policy had been rather to discourage the settlement of land in remote places, and to advise prospective settlers that the government was getting land ready for them where they could enjoy the comfort of civilized conditions.

In this connection the Premier noted the remarks of Mr. Bowser following a visit to the interior, where the government was obtaining reports and surveys, information which should have been in Victoria ten years ago, he declared. Mr. Bowser had said the government would be sending returned soldiers to the North Pole, if to this parcel of land. The Premier's reply to this was that "it was the best piece of land available out of the two and three-quarter million acres Mr. Bowser said he had reserved for returned soldiers."

**Want Citizens Only.**  
On a statement he attributed to Mr. Bowser that "the government was encouraging the settlement of Mennonites in British Columbia," Hon. Mr. Oliver said he could show where he wrote in reply to an enquiry from Kansas City that there was room in this province for settlers who would perform the duties of citizenship, but no place for those who did not. It was the government's policy to disfranchise these, and evaders of military service likewise, he declared. Of the attitude (continued on Page Four.)

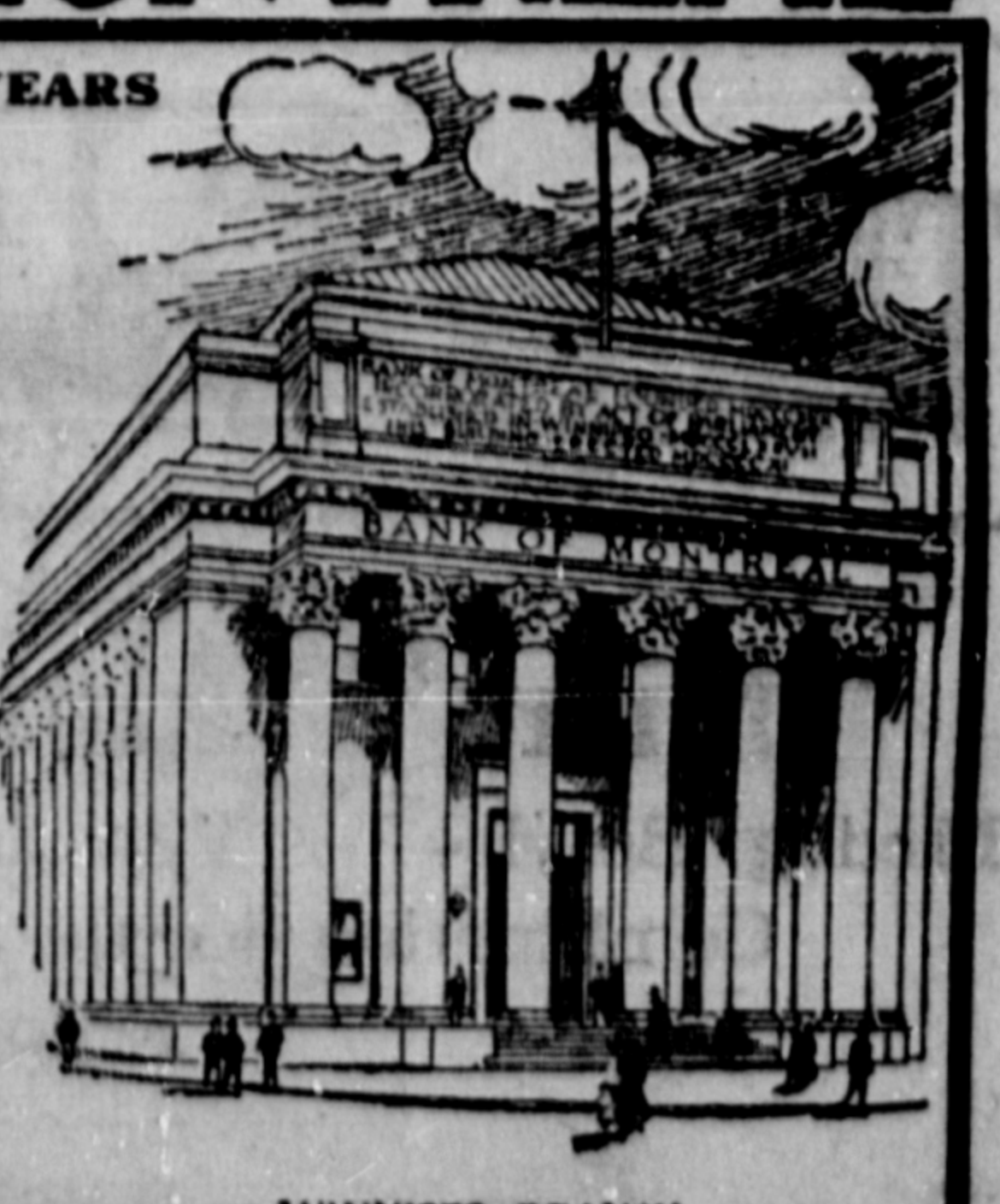
