WANT PROHIBITION TO BE CONTINUED

Text of Memorial Presented to Government by Dominion Committee; Ask for Referendum.

Continuation of prohibition until decided by referendum was urged on the Dominion Government by a delegation representing the Dominion Prohibition Committee and others interested in the movement. The delegation was composed of Judge Lafontaine, Montreal; G. A. Warburton, Toronto; Dr. J. G. Shearer, Toronto; Dr. A. More, Toronto, and D. B. Harkness, Gen. Secy., Winnipeg.

The delegation's memorial read as follows: "In view of the benefits now generally recognized by the people of Canada as having resulted from prohibition as provided by means of order-in-council limiting the trade in intoxicating liquor to sacramental, industrial, artistic, mechanical, scientific and medicinal purposes, thereby greatly reducing drunkenness, crime and waste of money and manhood, and

"In view of the general desire that every precaution shall be taken to reduce to a minimum the social, industrial and political unrest incident to the restoration of the affairs of the nation to normal peace conditions, and

"In view of the status of the order-in-council of March 11, 1918 (P.C. 589), when the articles of peace shall have been signed, and

"In view of the impossibility of submitting at this time the question of making prohibition permanent to a vote of the people of Canada without a manifest disregard of the rights of soldiers overseas to vote thereon.

"Therefore we recommend:

"1—That the Prime minister and Government of Canada be requested to take the steps necessary to continue in effect the condition of the order-in-council of March 11, 1918, by having the same embodied in legislation to be enacted by the Parliament of Canada.

"2—That the legislation so enacted be continued in effect until such time as a vote of the electors of the Dominion of Canada shall have been taken on the question of its continuance or discontinuance.

"3—That the vote on this question be taken at a date to be fixed by the government of Canada at least six months prior to the day of voting and with due regard to the restoration of civil life in Canada of the soldiers now overseas."

DEMOBILIZATION OF MUNITION WORKERS IN GERMANY RAPID

The demobilization of munition workers in Germany is proceeding rapidly. These include 300,000 women. Most of the young girls are going to work on farms, where they receive \$1 a day. James Grant, an American, is directing demobilization of the men workers. It is estimated there are 24,000 men in Berlin out of work. These receive \$3.75 a week as "workless compensation."

The latest word of Germany's attitude toward the Hohenzollerns is contained in a despatch from Zurich, which says the government has decided not to oppose extradition of the former Kaiser and Crown Prince.

The Belgians have entered Dusseldorf, and the British have occupied Cologne. The Americans are reported to be within a day's march of Coblenz.

Crossing Rhine.

Premier Lloyd George announced in a speech at Leeds that "the British at this moment are crossing the Rhine," indicating that Field Marshal Haig is losing no time in establishing a bridgehead in the Cologne region.

French officials have entered Metz and Strassburg, where they formally took possession of Alsace-Lorraine.
