President Wilson Enters Paris

BRITISH ELECTIONS BEING HELD TO-DAY; ELEVENTH HOUR ATTACK

TREMENDOUS OVATION TO PRESIDENT WILSON AS HE ENTERED CITY OF PARIS

**PRESIDENT AND MADAME POINCARÉ MET DESTINGUISHED
VISITOR AND CONDUCTED PARTY TO THEIR
TEMPORARY DOMICILE AT PRINCE
MURAT'S PALACE**

Paris, December 14.—President Wilson arrived in Paris, the present capital of the world, at 10:11 o'clock this morning. His arrival was heralded by the booming of guns throughout the city. Vast throngs in the Champs Elysee set up a tremendous cheer. Tremendous crowds lined the entire way from the railway station to Prince Murat's palace which will be the first foreign home of an American president.

President and Madame Poincaré greeted the American executive and his wife on the station platform. The two presidents rode in one carriage and their wives in another. Both carriages were decorated with flowers. The ovation was tremendous.

By a unanimous vote the Municipal Council of Paris decided to confer upon President Wilson the title of a Citizen of Paris.

CARLYLE BRAND HAS RECEIVED DECORATION

**Reported to Have Been Given the
Military Cross for His Work
With Machine Guns.**

Word has been received by Mr. and Mrs. C. Brand at Vancouver to the effect that their son, Carlyle, has been decorated with the Military Cross.

Brand left here as a private with the 102nd Battalion and a few months ago transferred to the machine gun battalion. He has had some interesting experiences in connection with his work, in one case having shot down an enemy aeroplane with his machine gun.

The news of his having received the recognition is welcomed by his many friends here. Mr. Brand's parents removed to Vancouver a few months ago and his sister, Nora, died recently from influenza.

EDITH CAVELL'S GRAVE LOCATED

London, Dec. 14.—The grave of Edith Cavell, the English nurse executed by the Germans, is believed to have been definitely located in a cemetery at Brussels and on Thursday the British community held a commemoration service at the grave. A wreath from King George and Queen Mary was laid on the mound of earth.

WORST HURRICANE EVER EXPERIENCED IN NORTHERN WATERS

Seattle, Dec. 14.—Five sailing ships were driven ashore at Unalakleet, Bering Sea, in November in the worst hurricane mariners say they have ever experienced in the north, according to the master of the steamer Elihu Thompson, which has just returned from the north. It was the storm which tore the famous whaler Halcyon, of Sea Wolf renown, loose from her moorings and wrecked her. None of the schooners except the Halcyon were seriously damaged, it was stated. The Elihu Thompson herself was forced into shelter and battled out the storm with two anchors out and engines going full speed ahead.

SHELL SHOCK MEN CURED BY GOOD NEWS

Paris, Dec. 14.—More than 2,000 American soldiers in France who were suffering from shell shock were cured by hearing the news of the signing of the armistice, according to a statement issued by Surgeon General Ireland.

GERMAN ARMISTICE HAS BEEN EXTENDED

Copenhagen, Dec. 14.—The German armistice has been extended until five o'clock of the morning of January 17, according to despatches from Treves.



WANTED FOR CRIMES.

BOLSHEVIKI TROOPS ARE MARCHING IN DIRECTION OF CENTRAL EUROPE

Paris, December 14.—Bolsheviki troops, consisting of eleven infantry divisions and cavalry and artillery, are marching toward Central Europe on a front of nearly 400 miles from the Gulf of Finland to the Dnieper river, according to despatches from Berne. The advance began on November 11, the day the German armistice was signed. German soldiers, advices add, are joining the Bolsheviki, who are reported to be destroying everything in their path and capturing material left behind by the Germans in their withdrawal westward.

WANT CHANGE IN PROHIBITION ACT

Victoria, Dec. 14.—A change in the existing prohibition act hereafter be carried on by a board whereby its administration shall be put forward to Premier Oliver today by John Nelson of Vancouver, president of the People's Prohibition party, and G. H. Robertson, president of the Victoria branch.

TORONTO POLICEMEN TO JOIN WITH LABOR

Toronto, Dec. 14.—Electing a new set of officers and unanimously in favor of affiliation with the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress, 286 members of the Toronto police this morning at 2 o'clock rescinded Thursday's motion to form an association in lieu of union.

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ELEVENTH HOUR ATTACK ON LLOYD GEORGE IN ENGLAND BY LIBERAL LABORITES

**CONSCRIPTION IS BONE OF CONTENTION—PREMIER SAYS
QUESTION DEPENDS ON WHAT PEACE TERMS
ARE MADE—EXTREMISTS
LOSING GROUND**

London, Dec. 14.—The British elections are on today. The campaign closed with a strong eleventh hour attack on the coalition regarding conscription. Liberals and Laborites complaining that the Premier's promises are too vague. He said he was looking forward to conditions of things wherein a league of nations would make conscription unnecessary.

"Whether you require conscription or not depends entirely on what peace terms are made. If you want permanent peace you must put an end to conscription armies on the continent of Europe," the Premier said. At the same time he states definitely there is no intention of renewing the Military Service Act, which was only passed to meet a great emergency. He describes these attacks as the usual attempts to frighten the electorate.

Labor extremists are losing ground through not calculating the violence of their treatment of the army question.

POLICEMEN'S STRIKE ENDED LAST NIGHT; AGREED TO ARBITRATE

Montreal, Dec. 14.—The strike of firemen, policemen, aqueduct engineers and incinerator employees at Montreal ended at nine o'clock last night, the men agreeing to arbitrate. Damage estimated at hundreds of thousands was done during the progress of the strike.

SOVIET GOVERNMENT IS FAVORED BY THE GERMAN COMMUNISTS

Amsterdam, December 14.—Dismissal of the Ebert-Scheidemann government, giving the Soviets legislative power, is advocated in resolutions adopted at a Communist meeting held at Munich by anti-Eisner factions, according to despatches from that city today. The resolutions also asked that a revolutionary tribunal be established.

BULGARIANS STILL ILLTREAT GREEKS

Salonika, Dec. 14.—Travellers arriving here from Bulgaria, particularly Thrace, declare that in spite of the fact that the war is nominally over Bulgarians continue to oppress and maltreat the Greeks residing in that country. The village of Agathopoulos, situated on the Black Sea, and inhabited solely by Greeks has been set on fire by Bulgarian troops, it is reported.

OBJECT TO FOCH'S ARMIES OVER RHINE

Copenhagen, Dec. 14.—All measures must be taken to prevent Foch's armies from marching east of the Rhine the Berliner Tageblatt declares in supporting a demand for the quick summoning of the Reichstag.

DISPERSAL AREAS FOR RETURNING MEN

Radical Change in Method of Distribution to Be Initiated By Dominion Government.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, Dec. 13.—The home coming of the soldiers, round which at present so much controversy rages, is to undergo a radical change with the establishment of the dispersal area system some time in January next. There are to be 21 dispersal areas in the Dominion, corresponding with the various centres of railway distribution of Canada, as against 11 military districts more or less situated at the capitals of the various provinces.

ALLIES TO BE ASKED TO PROTECT GERMANY AGAINST BOLSHEVIKI

Amsterdam, December 13.—The internal troubles of Germany have reached such a pitch that it has been decided to ask the Allies for their armies to occupy Berlin in case the Bolsheviki movement continues to grow. There is a distinct cleavage in that country between the moderate socialists and the radical element represented by the Bolsheviki.

PARTY WOULD ANNEX RHINELAND TO FRANCE

Cologne, Dec. 14.—A new and striking element has been injected into the complicated political situation in Rhineland by the alleged organization of a secret party which is working for the annexation of this German territory to France. Overtures will be made to the French Government, it is said, to take Rhineland into France on the same basis as Alsace-Lorraine.

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
