None of these remedies is at hand, but with the rehope for better things so far as imports and exports are concerned. Also there is on balance a ment by the Imperial Government and \$200,000,000 is owing the Banks of Canada by the Imperial Government, representing wheat and munition purposes. In due course, these combined amounts will aid the exchange situation. The premium in question should, therefore, diminish sooner or later to a point that will be immaterial. Meantime it discourages the importation of non-essentials from the United States, and the investment of Canadian funds in American and foreign securities."
