#### The Political Truce.

Although the Allies are still at war with the Central Powers, one of the noticeable things throughout the press of the Dominion is the fact that matters political are once more receiving greater attention. With the winning of the war accomplished, to all intents, and no longer absorbing all the public interest, criticism of the |\* present Government is becoming more pronounced, and in the |\* Unionist newspapers, too.




