THE COAL QUESTION

Expected Report From Committee
 Was Not Made to the City
 Council Last Evening.

The coal committee which was
 to have reported to the City Coun-
 cil last evening was not in a posi-
 tion to do so, but certain corres-
 pondence between the city and
 Mayor Gale of Vancouver and
 Nicol Thompson, late provincial
 fuel controller, was read. In re-
 ply to queries put to him, Mayor
 Gale stated that the city of Van-
 couver supplied civic and semi-
 civic buildings with coal, but
 charged the same rate as any
 coal dealer would charge. He
 stated particularly that the city
 of Vancouver was "not in the coal
 business," although an emergency
 stock of five hundred tons was
 kept on hand. Vancouver bought
 coal at the mine at \$6.45 and
 \$7.20, according to which colliery
 company they purchased from.

Mr. Nicol Thompson stated that
 under new regulations promul-
 gated on April 1 last, his appoint-
 ment was done away with in favor
 of the Provincial Board of Con-
 trol, which should work in con-
 junction with municipal appoint-
 ees. As the province had not yet
 appointed its board, he was still
 acting in an advisory capacity
 only, to Mr. McGrath, the Do-
 minion fuel controller. One point
 he brought out was that the price
 of coal was not fixed, but that the
 profit of the dealer was, and that
 was limited to 50c per ton. Mr.
 Thompson explained in rather
 technical terms how the increase
 in miners' wages had caused the
 price of coal to rise. On three
 occasions wages had been raised.

After hearing this correspond-
 ence read, the councillors were
 seen to be making lightening cal-
 culations in the analysis of the
 \$15 per ton charged here. This
 matter will be further discussed
 at the special meeting on Thurs-
 day, when the coal committee
 makes its report.

MANY HAVE NO VOTE

Payment of Poll and Road Taxes
 Not Sufficient—Intending
 Voters Must Have
 Registered.

No road and poll taxes were
 collected this year until after the
 date of registration for the voters'
 roll had passed. And as a result
 Alderman Casey at the Council
 meeting last night voiced the
 suspicion that there had been
 some sleight of hand work in this
 connection, as many intending
 voters had not registered pre-
 sumably because they had not
 paid the necessary tax in time
 qualifying them so. The mayor
 explained that the date of regis-
 tration had been well advertised
 and that the city clerk had been
 in attendance for three nights a
 week for this purpose. The
 opinion was voiced that some
 method of the taxpayer's name
 passing on to the voters' roll
 automatically ought to be adopt-
 ed.

The city clerk explained that
 from now on the poll and road
 taxes ought to be collected each
 month, and this probably will be
 done, commencing in the year
 1919.

The City Council agreed last
 evening that the Prince Rupert
 Drydock and Engineering Com-
 pany, Limited, be charged the
 same rate for water as the G. T.
 P. for the next ten years.

SYNOPSIS OF

LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed
 lands only.

Records will be granted covering only
 land suitable for agricultural purposes
 and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished,
 but parties of not more than four may
 arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with
 joint residence, but each making neces-
 sary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for
 five years and make improvements to
 value of \$10 per acre, including clearing
 and cultivation of at least 5 acres, be-
 fore receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not
 less than 5 years, and has made propor-
 tionate improvements, he may, because
 of ill-health or other cause, be granted
 intermediate certificate of improvement
 and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence
 may be issued provided applicant makes
 improvements to extent of \$300 per an-
 num and records same each year. Fail-
 ure to make improvements or record
 same will operate as forfeiture. Title
 cannot be obtained on these claims in
 less than 5 years, with improvements of
 \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared
 and cultivated, and residence of at
 least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may
 record another pre-emption, if he re-
 quires land in conjunction with his
 farm without actual occupation, pro-
 vided statutory improvements made and
 residence maintained on Crown granted
 land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20
 acres, may be leased as homesteads;
 title to be obtained after fulfilling resi-
 dential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes,
 areas exceeding 50 acres may be leased
 by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to
 include all persons joining and serving
 with His Majesty's Forces. The time
 within which the heirs or devisees of a
 deceased pre-emptor may apply for
 title under this Act is extended from
 one year from the death of such person,
 as formerly, until one year after the
 conclusion of the present war. This
 privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSHIP PROPERTY ALLOTMENT

Provision is made for the grant to
 persons holding uncompleted Agree-
 ments to Purchase from the Crown of
 such portion of the land, if divisible,
 as the payments already made will
 cover in proportion to the sale price of
 the whole parcel. Two or more persons
 holding such Agreements may group
 their interests and apply for a propor-
 tionate allotment jointly if it is not
 considered advisable to divide the land
 covered by an application for a propor-
 tionate allotment, an allotment of land
 of equal value selected from available
 Crown lands in the locality may be
 made. These allotments are conditional
 upon payment of all taxes due the
 Crown or to any municipality. The
 rights of persons to whom the pur-
 chaser from the Crown has agreed to
 sell are also protected. The decision of
 the Minister of Lands in respect to the
 adjustment of a proportionate allotment
 is final. The time for making applica-
 tion for these allotments is limited to
 the 1st day of May, 1919. Any applica-
 tion made after this date will not be
 considered. These allotments apply to
 town lots and lands of the Crown sold
 at public auction.

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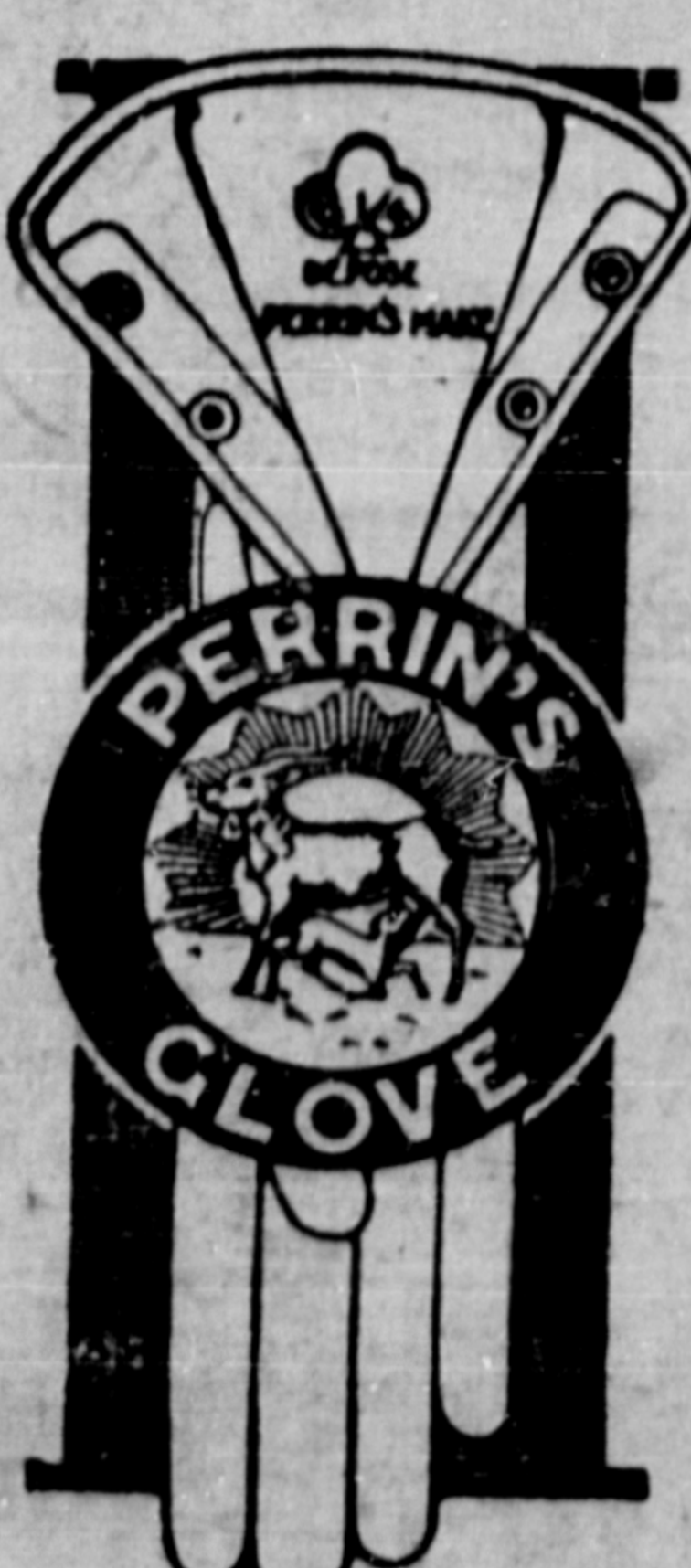
