

German Training Ship Sinks and 69 Persons Are Thought Drowned

KIEL, Germany, July 26:-Sixty-nine persons aboard the German naval training ship Niobe when she sank totoday off Ehmarn Belt were missing tonight and it is feared they were drowned.

The Niobe carried a crew of 100 cadets and junior cadets. The steamer Therese Russ managed to save 40.

It was about 2:30 a.m. when the Niobe keeled over in a storm and sank.
