## GRAZING LAW WILL BE PASSED THIS COMING SESSION

Provincial Government and Stock  
Men Confer and Frame Regu-  
lations—Local Associa-  
tions to be Formed.

Vancouver, Jan. 7.—The Gov-  
ernment will bring down new  
Grazing legislation at the session  
opening this month. This has  
been determined after a confer-  
ence with stock men at a meeting  
at Kamloops last week and ob-  
taining the experience of Mani-  
toba and Alberta in this connec-  
tion. The province will be divid-  
ed into grazing districts under  
the control of the Minister of  
Lands.

Stockmen in each district are to  
form an association and appoint  
a committee to co-operate with  
the department in framing regu-  
lations for that particular dis-  
trict.

The regulations will have en-  
forcement by orders-in-council  
dealing with such matters as  
allotment of range lands, pre-  
vention of trespass, fencing, salt-  
ing, supplying water, trail cutting  
etc. Permits will be issued for a  
specified number of stock.

The present system of boards  
of district overseers is to be abol-  
ished.

## BOLSHEVISM BRINGS ANARCHY TO GERMANY

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, Jan. 7.—The past week  
has witnessed a strong and gen-  
eral demand from the most in-  
fluential British newspapers, re-  
gardless of politics, for a prompt  
meeting of the Peace Conference  
and prompt action to stem the  
tide of chaos which is threaten-  
ing Germany because of the in-  
troduction of Bolshevism by way  
of the border states. There is a  
dawning recognition that if an-  
archy seizes central Europe the de-  
signs of the Peace Conference in  
drawing the boundary and levy-  
ing indemnities can be enforced  
only through military control and  
by merely scraps of paper.

## NINETEEN MONTHS AT THE BATTLEFRONT

Pte. McCreery, of Prince George,  
Fought With 102nd and Went  
Over the Top Nineteen  
Times.

Among the visitors to the city  
during the last day or two was  
Pte. J. L. McCreery, of Prince  
George, a returned soldier who  
is well known along the G. T. P.  
line.

Pte. McCreery left with the  
102nd Battalion in June, 1915,  
trained at Comox and fought un-  
der Col. Warden for nineteen  
months, going over the top no  
less than nine times and not  
getting a scratch. He had a short  
experience with the Imperials  
before returning, having been  
transferred to the Royal War-  
wicks.

McCreery served for some time  
under Transportation Sergeant  
Tom Maitland of this city. He  
also reports that the McDougall  
brothers were safe when he left.  
He stopped off here to meet some  
of the men of the battalion who  
had returned, including Dr. Mc-  
Neill, Joe Rowat and Teddy, Ben  
Self's star waiter.

## WIL ASKS FOR \$100,000,000 TO FEED EUROPEANS

Washington, Jan. 7. — Presi-  
dent Wilson has asked Congress  
through the State Department to  
appropriate one hundred million  
dollars for relief of famine suf-  
ferers in Europe. It is under-  
stood that the money is wanted  
chiefly to send food into a section  
of Western Russia, Poland and  
Austria-Hungary.

## SIBERIAN FORCES CHASE BOLSHEVIKI

Omsk, Jan. 7.—After capturing  
Perm, Siberian forces under Gen.  
Geida have pursued retreating  
Bolshevik troops towards Glazov.  
It is reported that the number of  
prisoners captured has reached  
31,000 and that an enormous  
quantity of equipment and sev-  
eral armored trains also fell into  
the hands of Siberian troops.

## POLES AND GERMANS CEASE HOSTILITIES

Rotterdam, Jan. 7.—The Poles  
and Germans have agreed to cease  
hostilities, following a meeting at  
Hohensalza, according to the Ber-  
liner Zeitung Ammitag. The  
newspaper says the meeting was  
held Thursday between represen-  
tatives of Poles and delegates  
from Hohensalza Posen, Brom-  
berg and Gnesen.
