When spread throughout Canada the billion feet will not give many millions to each district, but the order must be looked upon only as a starter. If it is filled satisfactorily there will doubtless be others to follow. In this neighborhood there are enough logs in the water and on the ground to fill one-tenth of the order, and it is hardly to be expected that as much as a tenth will be allotted here. No matter how many million feet are ordered i will be a decided improvement on the present condition. As the Imperial Munitions Board owns the logs in this district it is just possble that we may get preferred treatment.
