STATE OF SIEGE IS PROCLAIMED IN BERLIN BY THE GOVERNMENT; OFFICERS' BATTALIONS FORMED

Rebels Form New Government under Title of Revolutionary Committee composed of Herr Liebmann, George Ledebour and Herr Tick

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Amsterdam, Jan. 10.—A state of siege has been proclaimed in Berlin, according to late despatches from that city. The Ebert movement is firmly convinced that it will succeed in overthrowing the rebels, according to the Abendblatt of Berlin. At the request of Herr Noske, the new military governor of Berlin, loyal sailors are on their way to Berlin from Kiel. All the officers in Berlin placed themselves at the disposal of Noske and the Government is forming officers' battalions.

Berne, January 10.—Telegraphic reports from Berlin state that the rebels there have formed a new government under the title of the Revolutionary Committee. This committee comprises three members, Herr Liebmann, George Ledebour and Herr Tick, the last named being president of the Spartacan League. Spartacans thus appear still to be working with the Socialists of the Left or Independents. The dispatch would seem to indicate the possibility that the new government is a rival to the Ebert Scheidemann Government and has in fact displaced it, as today's advices through a Paris report.

Berlin, January 10.—Heavy fighting continued throughout Wednesday. During the afternoon street cars and taxi-cabs were overturned or destroyed. A general strike was declared at midnight.

UNSYMPATHETIC TO BOLSHEVIKI

Hon. Frank H. Keefer Expresses No One Interested With Him in Popular Sentiment in Strong Language.

Port Arthur, Ont., Jan. 10.—Hon. Frank H. Keefer, parliamentary secretary of state for external affairs, speaking at a meeting of the Board of Trade here said to the working men of the nation: "It is a decree of every man in public life to work in harmony with every branch of organized labor, but we will not for a moment stand for any of this damned Bolsheviki."

INCREASED ALLOWANCE

FINDLAY WAS ALONE, HE SAYS

Importation of 700 Cases of Whiskey.

Vancouver, Jan. 10.—No person but C. W. Findlay had any interest in the 700 cases of liquor he imported into British Columbia and which he stored in a warehouse at 1114 Hamilton Street, according to statements made by the ex-Prohibition Commissioner in the police court at a preliminary hearing of charges against H. J. Stump. Half of the consignments for which he paid a fine of \$1,000 for illegally importing, was shipped by him out of the province and the balance was stolen declared Findlay. Findlay gave evidence under protection of the court.

H. J. Stump will be formally committed for trial by Magistrate Shaw today.

MAJ. GEN. HEMMING DIES AT KINGSTON

Kingston, Jan. 10.—Major-General T. D. R. Hemming died at his residence yesterday after a brief illness. He had only recently retired from the command of Military District No. 3, having been succeeded by General V. A. A. S. Williams. He was born at Drummondville, Que., in 1863, and was a soldier over thirty-five years, entering the Canadian Militia in 1883 as a Lieutenant.

MONEY BYLAWS ARE DEFEATED IN VANCOUVER

Mayor Gale and Many Aldermen Are Re-elected by Acclamation; Four New Members in Five Wards.

Vancouver, Jan. 10.—All bills submitted to the Vancouver ratepayers yesterday, which provided for new expenditures were defeated. The amount voted against aggregated \$1,840,000. The aldermanic elections in five wards resulted in the return of four out of the five candidates supported by the citizens' ticket; namely, Capt. J. B. Elkins, W. C. Shelly, J. J. McRae, and F. E. Woodside, while Ald. Joseph Hoskins was the other winner. Mayor R. H. Gale and the balance of the 1918 council were returned by acclamation.

NEW YORK IS ON THE VERGE OF STARVATION

Hunger Point May Be Reached in Forty-Eight Hours Unless Something is Done.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

New York, Jan. 10.—Unless the railroads can bring food into New York by round-about points the hunger point may be reached within 48 hours and the lives of thousands imperilled as a result of the marine workers' strike, which tied up virtually all the traffic in the harbor.

At the end of the first day of the marine workers' strike which virtually halted traffic in New York harbor, the New York boat owners' association announced that the men had signed an agreement for the appointment of a conciliation board to arbitrate all differences. This announcement brought prompt denial from the strike committee which termed it "an owners welfare proposition."

RECIPROCITY WITH THE U. S. IS DEMANDED BY GRAIN GROWERS

Brandon, Man., Jan. 10.—The Manitoba grain growers in session here have endorsed the National Farmers' Platform. They also demand a lower tariff and unrestricted reciprocity with the United States.

COST OF PAPER.

Ottawa, Jan. 9.—The first day's session of the adjourned sittings of the Paper Control Tribunal was remarkable chiefly for charges of cost inflation made against paper manufacturers by W. N. Tilley, counsel for the publishers, who asked the tribunal reduce the cost of newsprint in rolls from \$69 to \$50.

MRS. COLLISON PASSES AWAY AT KINCOLITH

Brave Woman Missionary and Pioneer Closes Useful Career Still at Post of Duty.

Mrs. Collison, wife of Archdeacon Collison, passed away at Kincolith yesterday morning. She was married August 19, 1873, and a few days afterwards she and her husband left England as missionaries of the Church Missionary Society bound for what was then called "the North Pacific Coast" to labor among the natives and landed at Metlakatla on October 20, and for over forty-five years Mrs. Collison has been the devoted help-mate of a devoted minister of the Gospel, living first at Metlakatla, then at Masset, and now for over thirty-five years at Kincolith at the mouth of the Naas river.

As a deaconess Mrs. Collison nursed the wounded on the battle fields during the Franco-German war, and was present at the surrender of Metz. She also rendered valuable services in taking charge of the Protestant patients during the epidemic of smallpox which took place in Cork, Ireland, before her marriage. She was the first white woman to take up residence amongst the Tsimshians at Metlakatla, and later amongst the Haidas of Queen Charlotte Islands.

It was while at Masset among the Haidas that she nursed her husband through a most dangerous illness and single-handed kept out of her hut the medicine men who wanted to rattle over the dying. It is difficult to estimate the greatness of the loss to this coast of the Rev. W. H. Collison, then in his prime, had succumbed to the terrible fever brought on by living among the Indians in a most unsanitary village.

Mrs. Collison is survived by her husband and eight children, five sons, and three daughters. Two sons have been serving at the front, and one daughter following in her mother's footsteps, has been nursing wounded soldiers. Thousands of people have gathered round the fire-place and shared the warm Irish hospitality of the Mission House at Kincolith during these many years that the Archdeacon and his wife have kept open house. Such with many others join in their tribute of respect and extend their sympathy to the bereaved.

GERMANY IS A HUMAN STOCK BREEDING FARM

So Says Colonel A. A. Woods in Address at Grain Growers' Convention in Brandon.

Brandon, Jan. 10.—In a powerful address before the Grain Growers' Convention Colonel A. A. Woods declared that every enemy alien in Canada should be deported.
