**Trouble in Germany
May Get Worse.**

It is impossible to prophesy what troubles are in store in Germany. She sowed the wind and she is likely to reap the whirlwind. As long as the country is in the throes of rebellion it will be necessary for the Allies to have an army in the field and possibly they will have to step in and settle the trouble and establish a stable government. It is a terrible come down for a country that only recently was about to conquer the world, to have to ask the enemy to keep order for them at home.

**United States Loses
Money on Railroads.**

Government operation of railroads in the United States is proving a costly experiment. That country has a bill to foot this year amounting to \$196,000,000, an enormous amount. The country cannot continue to run in debt at that rate. Something will break if it continues. It was all very well to borrow money to win the war. That was necessary, but to go on borrowing to pay transportation debts is out of the question. A similar condition is likely to develop in Canada soon. The Government has two or three railways on its hands just now. That is enough to prove whether or not it is capable of running the business successfully. Let it prove the practicability of the scheme and then it will be time enough to talk of taking over the G. T. P.

Theoretically the Government ownership of railroads is sound. Practically we are not yet ready for the wholesale adoption of the system. For the present the thing to do is to give the present management of the railway a chance to pull the road out of its financial difficulties and then there will be something like a business proposition for the next generation to handle.

**Value of Press
To the Community.**

At its meeting last night the School Board passed a resolution instructing the clerk to notify the local newspapers of all meetings of the Board so that they might have a representative attend and report the proceedings. They expressed themselves as pleased that the reporters were present and showed a lively appreciation of the value of publicity to the schools and the community as a whole. The chairman even suggested that in case the press men did not understand any of the references at the meeting, they should ask questions and everything would be made clear.

In some quarters there is a tendency to make light of the value of the newspaper to the community. Difficulties are put in the way of securing proper reports. Seldom are extra copies of reports struck off for the press at the time that they are prepared for the members of boards. It is expected that the reporters will understand an aimless discussion when they have not the text before them on which the discussion is based. If the public would co-operate with the press, it would be an advantage to the public and would often obviate the foolish mistakes which often occur. The Board of School Trustees are to be congratulated on taking the lead in this matter.

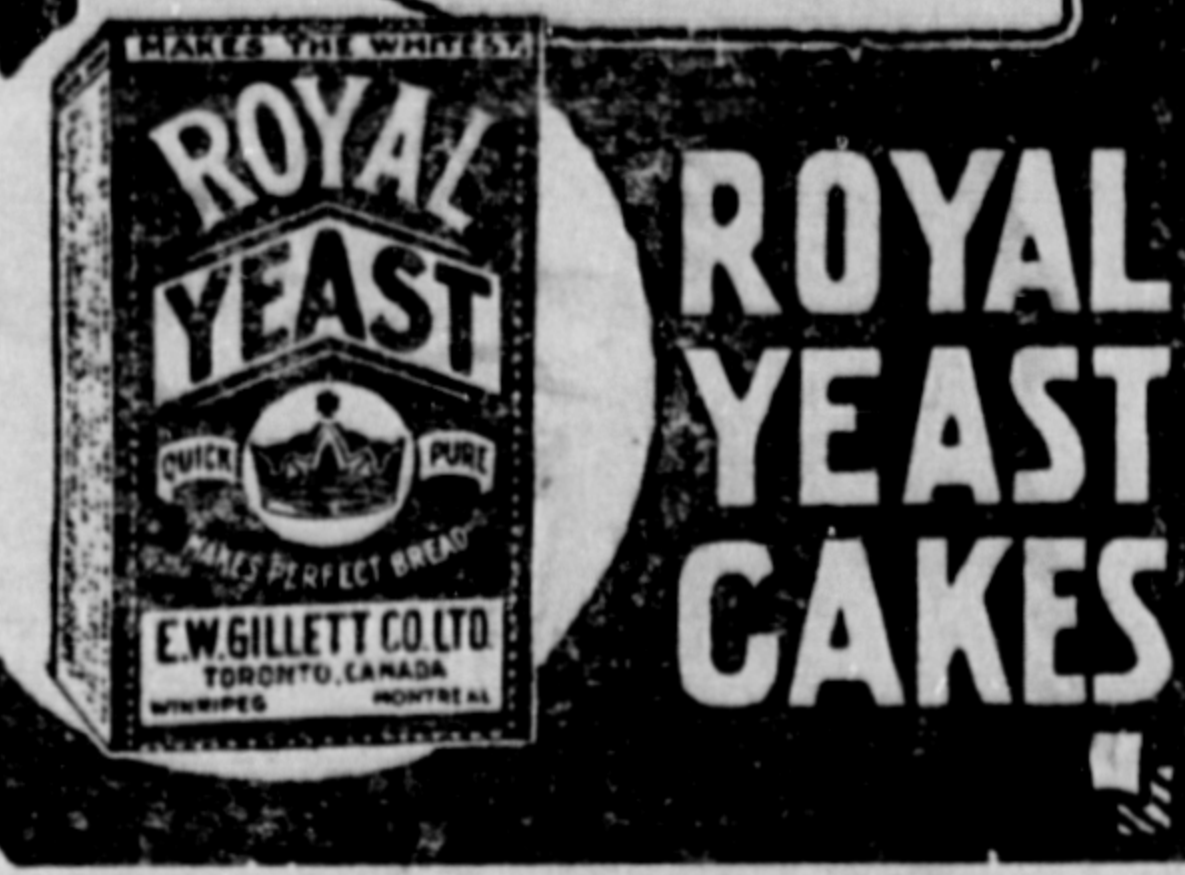
