

MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS PROCLAMATION — 1919 —

PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given to the Electors of the Municipality of the City of Prince Rupert, that I hereby require the presence of the said Electors at the City Clerk's Office, in the City Hall, City of Prince Rupert, on Monday the 13th day of January, A. D. 1919, at 12 o'clock noon, for the purpose of electing persons to represent them in the Municipal Council as Mayor and Aldermen.

The mode of nomination of Candidates shall be as follows:—

The Candidates shall be nominated in writing. The writing shall be subscribed by two voters of the Municipality as proposer and seconder, and it shall be delivered to the Returning Officer at any time between the date of this notice and 2:00 p. m. of the day of nomination; the said writing may be in the form Number 6 in the Schedule of the Municipal Act, and shall state the names, residence and occupation or description of each person proposed in such manner as sufficiently to identify such candidate, every candidate shall before he shall be capable of being nominated or elected, and not later than 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon of the day of nomination, file with me a declaration showing his qualification, in the form prescribed by Statute. These forms will be supplied by the City Clerk's Office to persons actually presenting nomination papers duly executed. In the event of a poll being necessary, such poll will be opened on Thursday, the 16th day of January, 1919, at the Council Chamber in the City Hall in the City of Prince Rupert, from the hour of nine o'clock a. m. to the hour of 7 o'clock p. m., of which every person is hereby required to take notice and govern himself accordingly.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR CANDIDATE FOR MAYOR

The qualification for a candidate for Mayor is that the said candidate shall be a British subject of the full age of 21 years, not disqualified under any law and who has for the six months preceding the day of nomination, been the registered owner in the Land Registry Office of land or real property in the City of Prince Rupert to the assessed value, on the last Municipal Assessment Roll of \$500.00 or more over and above any registered judgment or charge and who is otherwise duly qualified as a Municipal Voter.

QUALIFICATION FOR CANDIDATE FOR ALDERMEN

The qualification for candidate for Aldermen is that the said candidate shall be a person who is a British subject of the full age of twenty-one years, not disqualified under any law and who has for the six months preceding the day of nomination been the registered owner in the Land Registry Office in the City of Prince Rupert of the site on the last Municipal Assessment Roll of \$500.00 or more over and above any registered judgment or charge and who is otherwise duly qualified as a Municipal voter.

ELECTION OF POLICE COMMISSIONERS

AND FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that under the provisions of the Municipal Act, Amendment Act—1917, I require the presence of the Electors at the place and time above mentioned, for the purpose of electing one member who shall serve on the Board of Commissioners of Police, to take the place of George Hill, whose term expires in 1919.

The mode of nomination of candidates for such Police Commissioners shall be as follows:—

SCHOOL TRUSTEES

A BYLAW TO AUTHORIZE THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT TO GRANT EXEMPTION FROM CERTAIN TAXES TO THE PRINCE RUPERT DRYDOCK AND ENGINEERING COMPANY LIMITED.

WHEREAS, the Prince Rupert Drydock and Engineering Company Limited, a company duly incorporated in the Province of British Columbia, proposes to operate a shipbuilding plant and other industrial enterprises in the City of Prince Rupert;

AND WHEREAS, for the purpose of the aforesaid said Company is acquiring a lease of the following described lands and real property and improvements, situate in the City of Prince Rupert:—

(First), ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and land covered with water, situate in the bed of the harbour of Prince Rupert in front of water lot Block "G" in the City of Prince Rupert, in the District of Comox-Atlin and right angles from the last described course and from its southwestern extremity; thence S. 59 deg. 27' W. 865.71 feet; thence S. 68 deg. 27' W. 356.01 feet; thence N. 30 deg. 33' W. 358.46 feet; thence S. 59 deg. 27' W. 52.0 feet; thence N. 30 deg. 33' W. 848.56 feet, to the established harbour head line for Prince Rupert Harbour; thence along said harbour head line N. 53 deg. 46' 01" E. 1912.08 feet, thence S. 30 deg. 33' E. 1056.26 feet to the point of beginning, as shown outlined in red on blue-print plan attached and signed as relative thereto and containing an area of 56.78 acres more or less, together with those portions of waterfront right angles from the last described course and from its southwestern extremity, and signed as also all piers, wharves, landing stages and steps and the three sectional dry-docks appertaining thereto and used therewith.

And (Secondly) ALL AND SINGULAR such portion or portions of that certain parcel or tract of land and land covered by water, situate in the bed of said water lot Block "G" and of water lot in front thereof, which parcel or tract of land may be more particularly described as follows:—Beginning at a point in said water front

Block "G" distant 561.57 feet measured on a straight line of bearing North 5 deg. 39' 15" east from the point of intersection of the eastern limits of said water lot and the most southerly limits of said water lot, as shown on a plan of the Townsite of Prince Rupert at Victoria, B. C., in the Land Registry Office at Victoria, B. C., plan No. 923, Section One, thence north 43 deg. 13' west 58 feet to the established harbour head line, thence North 53 deg. 46' 01" East 1278.78 feet along said harbour head line; thence North 30 deg. 33' East 848.56 feet; thence South 30 deg. 33' East 358.46 feet; thence North 68 deg. 27' East 356.01 feet; thence North 59 deg. 27' East 848.56 feet; thence 1301.28 feet along a curve to the right of radius 2282.04 feet described in a point which lies in a straight line of bearing North 53 deg. 37' 48" West from the northeastern extremity of the last described course; thence South 68 deg. 27' 30" West 940.46 feet to the point of beginning, the parcel of land hereinafter described containing 37.70 acres more or less.

AND WHEREAS, the said Company has requested the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert to grant exemption from the payment of certain taxes upon the above described lands and improvements and the improvements upon or to be placed upon the lands aforesaid or upon the foreshore or water adjacent thereto, such exemption to run for a period of ten (10) years from the first day of January, A. D. 1919, subject to the terms and conditions that this bylaw hereinafter set forth.

AND WHEREAS, the said Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert as an inducement to the said company to erect and operate the said shipbuilding plant and other enterprises, has agreed that the exemption hereinafter mentioned shall be made.

AND WHEREAS the said Company requests and the said Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert proposes that there be given to the said Company exemption from General Taxes to be imposed by the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert during the term of ten (10) years but not exemption from special taxes imposed under debenture by laws or local improvement bylaws.

NOW THEREFORE, the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert enact as follows:—

1. During the period of ten years from the first day of January, A. D. 1919, the said Company, its successors and assigns shall be exempt from payment to the City of Prince Rupert and School District, Taxes and School Taxes, but shall be liable to pay taxes levied under general debenture and local improvement bylaws.

2. If the said Company, its successors and assigns fails to begin operating the shipbuilding plant, upon the premises hereinafter mentioned, within the space of one year from the first day of January, A. D. 1919, or if the said Company, its successors and assigns at any time during the continuance of the ten (10) years mentioned in this bylaw, fails to begin the operation of one year to operate the said shipbuilding plant or to operate some other large industrial enterprise upon the said premises, then this bylaw shall cease to have effect, and the exemption from taxes hereby given shall cease to exist.

3. Nothing herein contained shall in any way affect the agreement made between the City of Prince Rupert and the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company Limited and the Grand Trunk Pacific Development Company Limited and His Majesty the King in his Right to the Province of British Columbia and which agreement is set forth in Chapter 30 of the Statutes of British Columbia, 1912, in the Statutes of British Columbia, the intention being that this bylaw is only to be binding between the City of Prince Rupert and the Prince Rupert Drydock and Engineering Company Limited, its successors and assigns.

4. This bylaw shall come into force on the day of registration and shall be submitted to the vote of the rate-payers of the City of Prince Rupert.

A BYLAW TO AUTHORIZE THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT TO GRANT TO THE GREAT WAR VETERANS ASSOCIATION OF CANADA—PRINCE RUPERT BRANCH A SITE FOR A MEMORIAL BUILDING IN THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT.

THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT ENACT AS FOLLOWS:—

1. It shall be lawful for the City of Prince Rupert to grant a free site to the Great War Veterans Association of Canada (Prince Rupert Branch) to be used by them for the purpose of erecting and thereon a memorial building to be used for the benefit of the members of the said Association and their successors and for such public purposes as is from time to time determined.

2. The said site shall be granted to the said Association by deed to the Association or to trustees of the said Association to be nominated by them.

3. The Deed shall be signed by the Mayor and the City Clerk and shall be an ordinary quit claim deed without covenants.

4. The Land to be granted is:—All and singular that certain parcel or tract of land, situate in the City of Prince Rupert, containing by advertisement, Five Hundred and Twenty-three one thousandth Acres (523-1000) be the same more or less, and being composed of a part of parcel No. 122 referred to in the British Columbia Statutes for the year 1912, Chap. 30, Fol. 172, clause (1) of Schedule 1, and being in the City of Prince Rupert, containing by advertisement, Section One and five, deposited in the Land Registry Office on the 22nd day of March and which tract may be more particularly described as follows:—That is to say:—Commencing at the intersections of the northerly boundary of the Lane, Block 3, Section 5, with the westerly boundary of Agnew Place, thence westerly along said northerly boundary of lane two hundred and seventy-four and eighty-four one hundredth (274.84) feet, more or less, to its intersections with the easterly boundary of Fulton Street, thence northerly along the said easterly boundary of Fulton Street one hundred and thirty-nine and one tenth (139.1) feet, more or less, thence easterly and parallel to the northerly boundary of said land one hundred and seventy-eight and twenty-five one hundredth (178.25) feet, more or less, to the westerly boundary of Agnew Place; thence southerly along the said westerly boundary of Agnew Place, one hundred (100) feet to point of commencement, shown outlined in red on plan attached hereto. For the purpose of this description, Avenues are assumed to bear East and West and Streets, Northerly towards the Harbour.

5. This Bylaw shall come into force on the registration thereof.

Obligation to Soldier And Family.

Our grave obligation to the soldier and his family cannot be questioned. The modern state is happily more conscious of its responsibilities to the fighting man than was ever the case in the past, for this is "the first war since the world began which has seriously disturbed the conscience of mankind, and set it working on the duties of conscious remorse and active gratitude." The duties of restoration which, as a nation, we have been led to assume are not to be evaded.

Making Soldier Into Citizen.

The process of making a soldier into a civilian is no easier than that of turning civilians into soldiers. Every man, with a few exceptions, discharged from the army will be thrown into civil life with the loss of the precious quality of initiative, a loss serious in proportion to the length of his service. The private soldier lives a life in which his thinking is done for him. He is forbidden to rely on his own judgment, and he is forced to accept, even in regard to the trifling details of his existence, the orders of a superior. The soldier's discharge cannot alter this carefully developed habit of mind. When he originally became a recruit he remained a civilian for months after he put on the uniform, the reverse is equally true. After his discharge the soldier is still in effect a soldier until a forgotten attitude of mind has had an opportunity to re-assert itself. Through a critical period, just when he should be re-establishing himself in civilian life, the easy-going fatalistic habit of the old soldier is likely to cling. This we must keep in mind lest the ex-soldier be made a victim of his very patriotism. It is an irony of fate that the man who has served his country longest at the Front and who has been under the heaviest strain "in the line" will inevitably find the transition to peace the hardest to accomplish. And the relaxation from a rigid discipline and the dreary monotony of routine are perils which will confront every soldier wherever his work may have lain. The public will only need to be reminded of this to view his problem with an understanding mind. The returned soldier does not ask for sympathy or for favors, but he is entitled to receive as his right, both from his employer and from his fellows, an intelligent comprehension of his difficulties.

Solemn Debt Owed to Men.

Canadians owe a solemn debt, a debt beyond repayment, to the men of their Expeditionary Force, who, let us never forget, placed themselves between us and the German host. But if our obligation to them can never be discharged in full, our simple duty as their fellow citizens will not be accomplished until the last man to leave the army has been re-established in our national life. He must be given a chance to re-discover himself in a world that will be strangely new.

Teaching Blind to See With Hands.

Teaching the blind to see with their hands and to do useful work and thus mitigate to some extent the affliction which has fallen upon them is the work of the St. Dunstan's Hostel. It is especially for the care of those who have lost their sight in the war. The appeal for such a cause cannot go unheeded. That is the reason why the ladies of this city are interesting themselves in the cause by giving a benefit concert at the Westholme Theatre tomorrow night. The cause is the most appealing one that ever comes before the people of this city and the concert will be a splendid one. That should be double reason for patronage.
