## CIVIC ELECTIONS HERE TOMORROW

Not Much Interest in Campaign Taken So Far—Polling 9 to 7 at City Hall.

Those people who, despite the disorganization of public and private affairs during the time of the influenza epidemic, are property holders, or otherwise have paid their road tax and at the same time have registered their names as taxpayers with the city clerk, will have to keep in mind that tomorrow is the day of the municipal elections. While public interest this year may in certain places be as keen as ever over this annual choice in the civic government, still there so far has been little outward sign of any great interest.

The candidates have chosen to preserve considerable reticence so far as public speech is concerned, and they have denied to the man in the street the fun of seeing themselves heckled. Time was when an election, municipal or otherwise, meant something even for the average individual, whether voter or not.

The polling will take place tomorrow from 9 a.m. until 7 p.m. in the city hall. City Clerk Peters is returning officer, and with his deputies hopes to give all the voters an opportunity of expressing themselves satisfactorily.

Sum of \$493 Realized From One Entertainment on Friday Following Christmas.

The fact that the sum of \$493 was raised by the sale of baskets, goes to show that the Indians at that place are sincere in their efforts toward carrying out their faith.

In addition to the sum raised from the sale of baskets, the church committee subscribed \$62, making in all the handsome sum of \$555. It is the intention to purchase a large bell with some of this money and to devote the remainder of the amount to the purchase of a new organ for the church.
