3. Maintenance of complete Red Cross establishments with personnel and supplies for Canadian forces in Siberia. 4. Maintenance of complete Red Cross establishment with

personnel and supplies for the Canadian Army of occupation in Europe for so long a time as any Canadian forces remain in Europe.

Care, personal service and comforts for Canadian forces during demobilization and return of officers and men from France and England to Canada.

6. Relief for destitute sufferers of war.

It is the intention of the local branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society to continue its work until all responsibilities mentioned have been discharged in their entirety. The citizens of Prince Rupert have rendered a noble service during the past four years in all matters touching Red Cross work and we solicit a continuance of that support.

This appeal is made so that you may understand that the end f the fighting at the front does not mean the end of the war for the Red Cross. Our Crimson Badge of Mercy should be the last banner to leave the blood-soaked fields of France and every member and supporter of the Red Cross must understand that money and work will be required in the future as in the past.
