To the Editor:
Sir—Your ideas of the price of lots and the cost of house build- ing in Prince Rupert are of a practical and reliable nature, as described in one of your editor- ials.

Will not some of the progress- ive citizens look around the river and shores for some good clean sand and purchase some lime and begin the manufacture of sand brick? This is a class of cheap building material that I can thor- oughly recommend as suitable for the climate of Prince Rupert, if well made, and can be supplied much cheaper than bricks made of clay. I make this statement af- ter fifteen years close observation of the durability of sand bricks under nearly all conditions.

Houses built of nine-inch hol- low walls (that is with a space between and tied with iron ties) do not require straps and let on the inside and can be built damp proof and fire proof. Of course the walls would be thicker for high buildings.

Sand bricks are cheap and suit- able for high-class apartment buildings, stores and offices, can be colored red to any depth of shade and made ornamental in design. I trust The News will continue in its present progres- sive manner for the benefit of the citizens of this new city.
