### CASSIAR CROWN MINE IS TO BE DEVELOPED

Company Already Employing a Few Men Running Tunnel 200 Feet Long.

It is reported that the Cassiar Crown Copper Company, owners of the Cassiar Crown mine on Grouse mountain, have decided upon an extensive program of work in connection with the development of that property, which will be commenced shortly and carried on continuously, and as the report comes from an unusually reliable source, there is good reason to expect considerable mining operations during the summer, and even encourages a hope approaching belief that the coming summer will see a general revival of activity in the mining industry, with the Cassiar Crown first in the field.

In fact it is deduced that the plans of the Cassiar Crown people are already being worked out on the hill in a small way as a starter, and this from the fact that a few men are now at work at the property. This crew is running a tunnel alongside the big four-foot vein recently opened up, to prove continuity and extent of the ore body, and to block out the ore. It is their reported intention in this connection to drift two hundred feet along the showing and to cross-out the vein at that point, and then to continue the drift another two hundred feet. It is also stated that as a result of the recent visit of Mr. Pohlman, one of the officials of the company, the interests of Chas. Barrett, one of the original locators, have been taken over by the company for a consideration of about six thousand dollars.

Work in the nature of a tunnel is also being carried on at another portion of the Cassiar Crown property, as a part of the development plan.—Interior News.

### NEW COMMISSIONER GALLANT OFFICER

Lieut.-Col. Selater, D. S. O., Who Succeeds Findlay Saw Four Years' Service.

Lieut.-Col. Selater, better known known as Jim Selater, who has been appointed prohibition commissioner in succession to Findlay, has only just returned from service overseas. He is a winner of the Distinguished Service Order and was overseas for about four years.

Throughout British Columbia Colonel Selater's appointment will be warmly received. Particularly will this be so among his former comrades of the battlefield. The new commissioner, it should be noted, is a native of the Orkney Islands and came to Canada when he was about twenty-two years of age. He came direct to and made his home in the city of Vancouver. He is the proud father of three sons and several daughters. And although one of his sons had reached the enlistment age his own years did not prevent the call of the flag reaching him in earnest. Immediately it was known just what Canada intended to do, Colonel Selater offered his services to his country and left Canada as one of the "originals" with the first Canadian contingent.

His officer son, James Selater, Jr., however, gave his life for the Empire's cause and lies buried in the shell-torn terrain of France. The young officer had a brilliant career before him and had already won his way to an important army post.
