Old Country in Grip of Strikers

RIOT ACT IS READ IN GLASGOW AND THIRTY THOUSAND ULSTER POLICE ON DUTY IN IRELAND

Strikes are spreading throughout the country and military forces march into Glasgow; Effort to extend movement throughout Ireland; Government takes no action.

London, Feb. 1.—There are a number of strikes in different parts of the country but especially serious are they in Scotland and Ireland. Troops have arrived in Glasgow and the city is practically in the hands of the military.
Glasgow, Feb. 1.—Serious conflicts between the police and strikers developed yesterday in which at least forty persons were more or less badly injured, among them Sheriff Mackenzie, Chief Constable Stevenson, Deputy Constable Rennie and a number of policemen. These were all injured by bottles thrown by strikers when the police were clearing the streets in baton charges.
Two of the strike leaders, William Gallagher and David Kirkwood, were arrested and later charged with inciting to riot. Both are still in custody.
During the height of the disorders the Riot Act was read and it was contemplated to invite the militia, but the order was cancelled when Gallagher and Kirkwood were permitted by the authorities to address the strikers and exhort them to march off in orderly procession.

In Ireland.
Belfast, Feb. 1.—The employers have issued an ultimatum to the strikers here, declaring they must return to work at once. The alternative is six weeks' lockout.
Thirty thousand Ulster volunteers and special constables are being held in reserve to preserve order.
Extend Activities.
Belfast, Feb. 1.—The strike committee has announced that it contemplates trying to extend the strike to the whole of Ireland.

Government's Position.
Replying to an appeal from Joseph Devlin, member of Parliament, that he intervene in the strike, David Lloyd George, British Premier, replied that the British Government did not control the hours of labour and that he was in complete agreement with the reply of Andrew Bonar Law, Lord Privy Seal, to the Provost of Glasgow, declining to intervene in the strike there.
The Premier added that this reply applied with equal force in Belfast.

**ADKINS ARRESTED
FOR FALSE PRETENSES**
Sum of \$10,000 Said to be Involved in Case of Calgary Mine Official.

Calgary, Feb. 1.—Information laid before the Calgary police and sworn to by W. E. M. Connaught, secretary-treasurer of the Bouvier Mining Co., Ltd., led to the arrest of Wm. Adkins in Vancouver. The sum of \$10,000 is involved in the case. It is alleged that Adkins by false pretences obtained money from a number of prominent Calgary business men.

**LORD GREY FAST
BECOMING BLIND**
New York, Feb. 1.—Viscount Grey, former British Foreign Secretary, is fast becoming blind and has enrolled as a student at St. Dunstan's Hostel for the blind, where he is learning typewriting.
The Rev. A. Barger went east as far as Hazelton on this morning's train. He expects to touch other eastern points also.

WAR VETERANS HAVE TROUBLE WITH THOSE WHO WORRY EMPLOYERS

Calgary, Alta., Feb. 1.—The Calgary Great War Veterans' Association has issued a formal notice denouncing returned men who, without authority, call on employers in respect to the men they employ. The association protests against the employment of aliens, but says that it proposes to handle the matter in a lawful way.

LONE BANDIT ROBS A TRAIN SECURES \$10

Went Through Coaches Bound For Vancouver and Made Passengers Hold Up Their Hands.

Seattle, Wash., Feb. 1.—Passengers on the Great Northern owl train leaving Seattle at 11:45 p. m. for Vancouver, were held up by a lone bandit a short distance outside of South Bellingham early yesterday morning. Boarding the train at Samish he went through the day coaches and forced every passenger to hold up his hands.
The bandit left the train as it slowed down at South Bellingham. He secured only \$10.

TEXTILE WORKERS ARE DEMANDING AN EIGHT-HOUR DAY

New York, Feb. 1.—Orders directing 7,000,000 members of the United Textile Workers of America to establish an eight hour day on Monday regardless of objections of the employers have been issued by the Union's executive committee.
John Golden, general president of the Union said the order had been telegraphed to 380 locals throughout the country and that the responsibility for the next step was up to manufacturers. The latter say they will close down if the workers insist on shorter hours.

LACK OF EVIDENCE IN CHARGE OF THEFT

Judge Young Dismisses Case Against Aleck Chyzewski of Anyox in County Court.

Aleck Chyzewski, who was charged with the theft of a two and a half dollar gold piece was brought up for speedy trial before Judge Young yesterday afternoon at 2:30. A. M. Manson appeared for the accused and W. E. Fisher represented the Crown. J. Wolfe's evidence was that on December 24 the accused walked into his store and looked over some jewelry which he did not purchase, and on the day after he noticed that this particular gold coin was missing.
The evidence of the accused was that Wolfe showed him the jewelry about a week before that when he purchased this particular coin, and straightway attached it to his watch chain.
On consideration of the fact that not enough evidence was procurable, Judge Young dismissed the case, after telling the prisoner that he would have to pay J. Wolfe any debts he had incurred with him.

PRINCESS SOPHIA CAN BE SALVAGED

Diver Jacobson Reports Vessel Still Intact and May be Raised.

Juneau, Alaska, Feb. 1.—Divers and salvage workers having the work of removal of bodies from the Princess Sophia which sank in Lynn Canal off the Alaskan coast, Oct. 26, with the loss of many lives, report through marine diver Jacobson, that the vessel is intact. It is said she can be salvaged. He denied the earlier reports that she had broken up.

SIGNIFICANT INCIDENT AT OPENING OF LEGISLATURE EXCITES MUCH COMMENT

TWO SOLDIER MEMBERS ARE INTRODUCED BY PREMIER AND A SOLDIER AND MAY MEAN FORMATION OF A SOLDIER PARTY IN THE PROVINCE

Victoria, B. C., January 31.—(p. m.) With the business of the legislative session suspended until Monday afternoon, members of the Government have been busy with numerous matters in caucus.
While His Honor's speech foreshadowed more important measures to be brought down, one significant proposal absent from the official forecast was that dealing with the initiative and referendum. A somewhat exhaustive discussion in caucus will take place before its presentation.
One feature of Thursday's ceremonial in connection with the introduction of Major Borde and Frank Gielma, two of the newly elected members, to Mr. Speaker, differed from the ordinary in that Hon. John Oliver and Major J. W. McIntosh conducted the formal introduction. W. J. Bowser, leader of the opposition, remained an interested spectator. The possibility of a soldier party is mooted with Dr. McIntosh as its titular head. What may be the attitude of Lieut. McKenzie of Delta who is on his way back to B. C. is not known nor can it be said whether or not Pte. Duncan, the member elect for Cowichan, would join it. When these two last mentioned arrive the soldiers will be almost as strong in the House as the Conservatives and five times as strong as the Socialists.

CONTROL ENEMY COLONIES BY NEW LEAGUE

Peace Conference in Secret Session Discussed Constitution of That Body.

Paris, Feb. 1.—The Allied Ministers have decided to send Allied delegates to Austrian Silesia for the purpose of assuring the peaceful exploitation of the industrial districts in agreement with the Czechs and Poles, pending the territorial settlement of questions affecting them by the Peace Conference.
While the Supreme Council was occupied yesterday with some of the lesser controversies regarding the Balkans and Poland they also took up in private session the matter of the disposition of the German colonies.
Having accepted the American plan for supervision by a League of Nations it has now become necessary to constitute that body and give it substance so that it may be in a position to perform the task committed to its care, pending territorial settlement by the Peace Conference.

BETTER HOUSING.

A Better Housing Bill was also introduced by Mr. Pattullo providing interlocking machinery to enable the Province to take part in the national housing plans.
