BOOTLEGGING IS A FINE ART

Many Clever Tricks Used by Illicit Dealers to Smuggle Liquor Into State.

Spokane, Wash., Jan. 31.—When Montana went "dry" at midnight, December 30, last, by popular vote, the "bootlegger," as the dealer in contraband liquor is popularly called, realized that his day was going, if it had not already gone. Since 1915, when Washington became a prohibition State, the business of bootlegging has been a thriving one and one fraught with little risk to the clever doger of the law.

Officers of the law tell many stories of the ingenuity used in bringing contraband into this state. Baby coffins often served the purpose, the muff and fur-bellows of an actress often concealed a bottle of whiskey or wine; imitation bibles fooled the officers more than once, false bottoms in trunks and traveling cases frequently held bottles. And more than one shipment of rags and junkmen's stuff covered up pints and quarts of the most profitable liquor.

Clever Ruse.

One illicit dealer had a scheme all his own. He telegraphed to the Spokane officers from a town in Western Montana that a shipment of liquor, concealed in a carload of wood, would reach Spokane on a certain freight train. He gave the number of the car. Sure enough the train arrived. A perspiring crew of upholders and enforcers of the law toiled industrially and unloaded every stick of wood, but there was no liquor. It developed later that there was another carload of wood in that train and that it had been unloaded by a stranger who left the wood but carried off the contraband. The wily bootlegger had sent the telegram to keep the officers busy while he unloaded his stuff.

Illicit Dealers.

Anonymous information helps the officers, but often it is given in an effort to mislead. Other informants fail to aid the officers. Quarrels of jealousy between bootleggers often result in the arrest of some.

The illicit dealers use automobiles with double tanks with false bottoms, built expressly for transporting the liquor, said a well known and active member of the city detective force. "Once I opened the top of a piano," he said, "and found ten quarts of the 'best.' They will cache it between walls, over ceilings and under floors or dig a hole in the cellar and bury it. Many a furnished house has been rented just as a cover for storing liquor."

Waterbag.

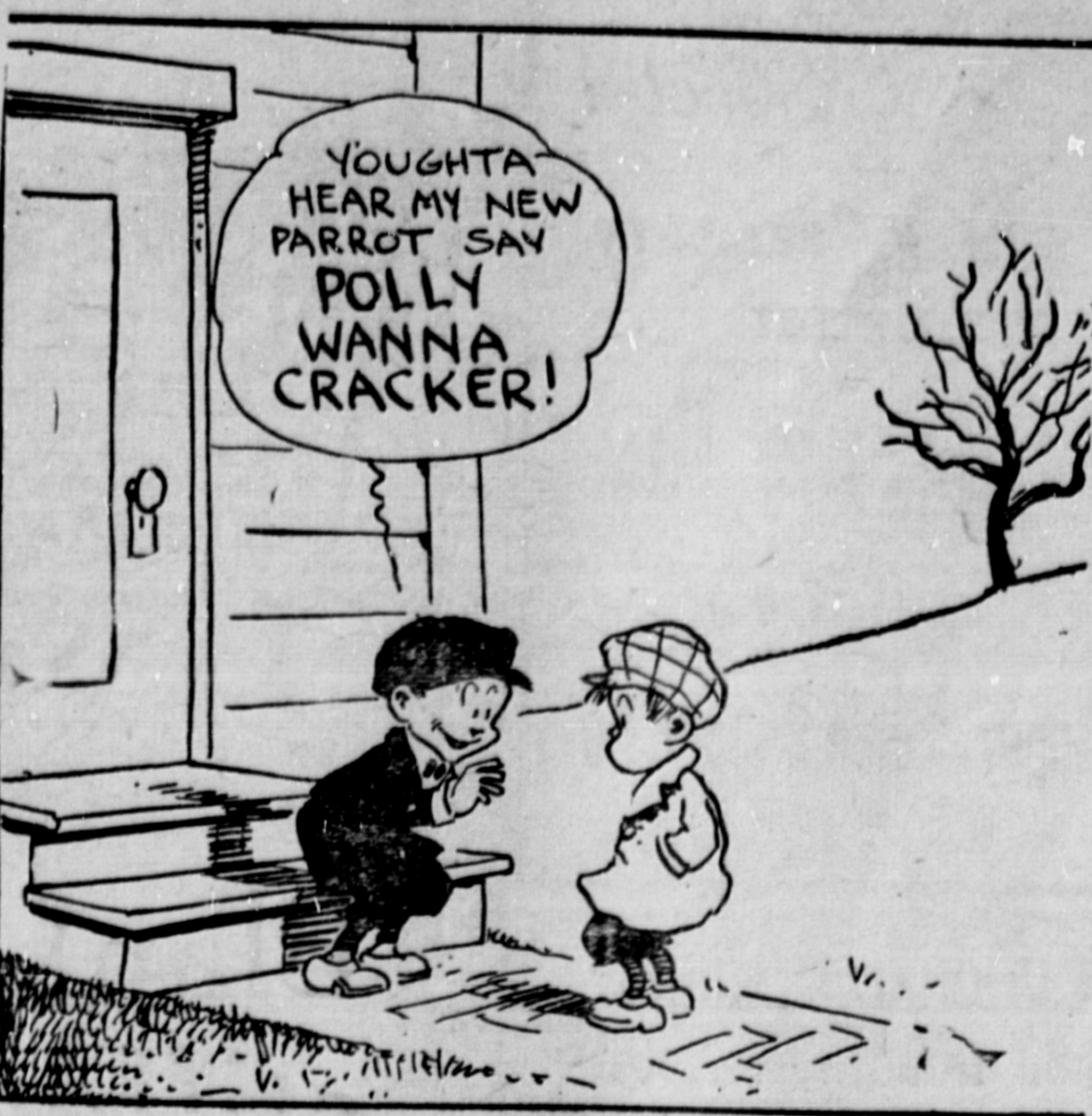
As the amusing incidents, the detective says, "There's the fellow who went around with a water bag—dishing it out for 50 cents a drink."

"Until recently a well known character of Spokane served his regular customers in his automobile, between five and seven o'clock in the morning. His receptacle was made to look like a bible and it held two quarts."

The detective tells one on himself. He observed a woman leaving the lunch room of a certain

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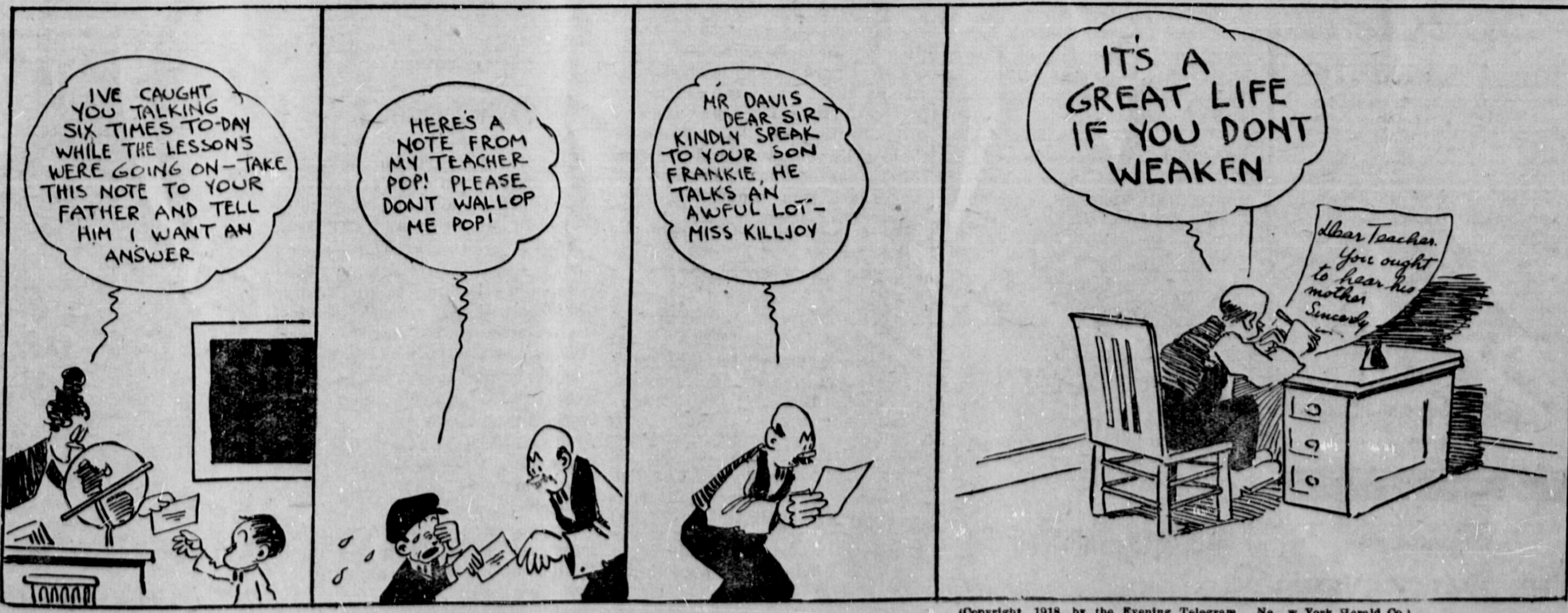
