VETERANS APPRECIATE THE GIFT OF LAND

The following relating to the donation of a building site to the Great War Veterans is from a recent issue of the Veteran's Weekly:

"As we predicted before, the issue was safe enough with the people of Prince Rupert. We remember the occasion when the first company left, under Lt. Col. C. W. Peck, V. C., D. S. O., M. P. A hurried canvas was made of the city and over \$2,000 was subscribed for these boys. The night before their departure, a mass meeting was held in the exhibition building and each man was handed an envelope with \$11.44 in cash in it. Later on a wrist watch was given to each man, another example of the city's feeling toward her representatives in khaki. From time to time parcels of socks and other knitted goods were 'dished out' to us, knitted by the ladies of the northern metropolis, and now, with the grant of a site of generous proportions, we claim that Prince Rupert is one of the leading cities of Canada in the kindly way she has treated her fighting sons. Truly, one is proud to be able to point out this example to all other cities in the Province, nay, in the Dominion.

VOCATIONAL TRAINING FOR DOMINION ABOUT TO BE LAUNCHED SOON

(Special via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, Feb. 3.—A big scheme of vocational training for the whole Dominion, involving Federal assistance to the provinces totalling \$25,000,000 to be expended during the next ten years, is being worked out by the Government and will probably be enacted into legislation during the coming session.

The plan is modelling somewhat along the lines of the recommendations made by the Technical Education Commission appointed in 1910 under the Laurier Government, but so far left in abeyance.

POLICE FIRED AND COMMISSIONERS JOIN WITH RAIDING SQUAD

Clean Up of Prince George Follows Election and Suspension of Chief.

A complete clean-up in the city police department, including the suspension from duty of Chief of Police Dolan, was decided on by the new board of police commissioners at their meeting Friday night, says the Prince George Citizen. Conditions regarding the existence of alleged gambling dives and Chinese premises were discussed and at the close of the meeting a raiding squad, headed by Commissioner Fisher and Louis Vibbard, who had been temporarily appointed chief, visited the Chow Lee establishment where a search revealed complete opium smoking paraphernalia and a seemingly well equipped "hop joint." The equipment was promptly confiscated and the owner and occupants of the place arrested.

Before Magistrate Daniell on Saturday Chow Lee pleaded guilty to conducting a disorderly house and was fined \$100 and costs. Chow Kim and Yum Lee, frequenters, contributed \$20 and costs each.

Gamblers Discovered. While one of the police squad was endeavoring to capture a fugitive Chin who had escaped from the Chow Lee joint, he was ed into a neighboring shack where a full-sized "game of draw" in which several white men were participating, was discovered. The constable immediately put the entire party under arrest. In the police court the keeper was fined \$100 and costs and the players various sums aggregating another hundred dollars.

Commendation. The new commissioners are meeting with cordial commendation for the firm stand they have taken in curbing the lawless conditions that were rapidly growing in Prince George. Heretofore the excuse has prevailed that while the authorities were cognizant of such disregard of the laws it was impossible to secure a conviction.
