FINDING LAND FOR RETURNED SOLDIERS

Government Making Efforts to Get Best Results From Policy of Settlement.

With regard to the placing of soldiers upon the land, W. G. Black of the Soldiers' Land Settlement, has issued the following statement: "The Soldiers' Land Settlement is completing its organization with the utmost rapidity.

Legislation providing for the requirements of land near railways will be presented to Parliament at the next opening. All soldiers in Alberta and any other province, who are qualified by farm experience to go on the land next spring, will have equal opportunity of doing so.

Crown Lands.

There is Crown Land available upon which they might settle, but the Settlement Board is discouraging all soldier settlers from locating at points remote from market facilities and on land not of the finest quality.

It is the policy of the Board to see to it that no soldier is permitted to settle under conditions whereby he will not be able to secure the highest results for his labors. Civilian settlement in the past has not been so regulated.

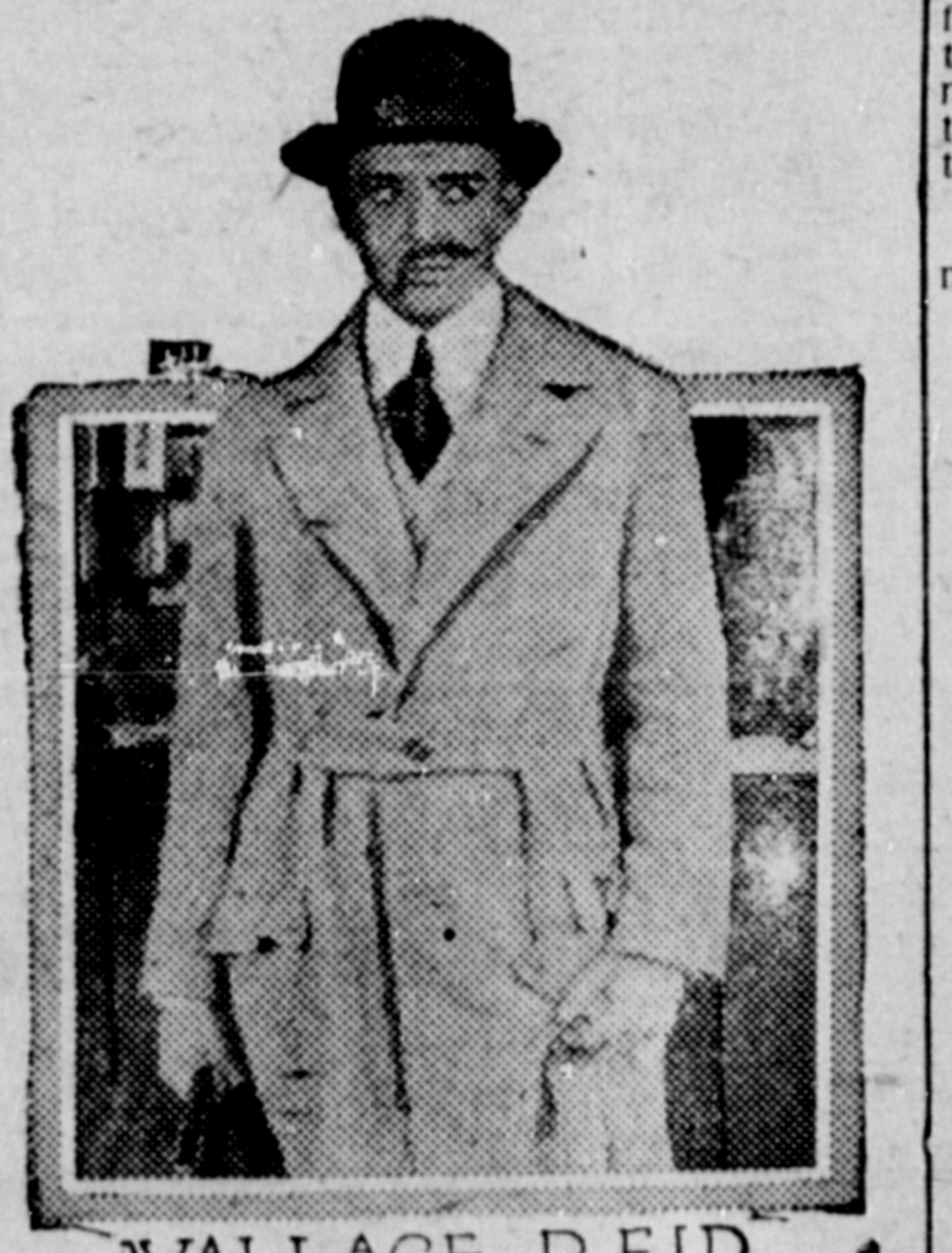
Delays.

ALDERMAN CASEY ENTERS PROTEST

Takes Exception to so Much of Work of Council Being Done Behind Closed Doors.

At the regular meeting of the City Council last night Alderman Casey made several protests against doing so much of the business of the Council in committee instead of in open council. He was particular to state that no business done at the committee was legal unless it was confirmed by the Council.

The committee reported the appointment of Aldermen Casey and Perry to the committee to act in conjunction with the Great War Veterans in connection with their memorial. The report was made only after being asked for by Alderman Casey who reminded the Council that everything done at the Committee should be reported to the Council.

WATER NOTICE

DIVERSION AND USE.
TAKE NOTICE that Thos. J. Kirkpatrick, whose address is Terrace, B. C., will apply for a licence to take and use 1 cubic foot per second of water out of Thornhill Creek which flows north and drains into Skeena River about 100 feet west of Ferry Landing.
The water will be diverted from the stream at a point about 1500 feet south-east of the Skeena River, and will be used for power purpose upon the land described as Lot 839, Range 5, Coast District.
This notice was posted on the ground on the 9th day of January, 1919. A copy of this notice and an application pursuant thereto and to the "Water Act, 1914," will be filed in the office of the Water Recorder at Prince Rupert.
Objections to the application may be filed with the said Water Recorder or with the Comptroller of Water Rights, Parliament Buildings, Victoria, B. C., within thirty days after the first appearance of this notice in a local newspaper.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.
Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is not timber land.
Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.
Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.
Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.
Records with permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.
Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in connection with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.
For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.
PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.
TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.
Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. It is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.
