BARTENDER IS FINED FIFTY ON AN APPEAL

John Rose Conducts Own Case in County Court But Loses and Pays.

An appeal by the Indian Department was heard yesterday afternoon before Judge Young in the County Court against the decision of Police Magistrate Carss in the case of John Rose, bartender of the Empress Hotel. This charge, which was one of selling near beer to Indians, was dismissed in the police court, it being held for the defence that the accused mistook the Indian for a Japanese. Yesterday afternoon the accused conducted his own case and called many witnesses to prove that the beer alleged supplied was ordinary near beer, commonly called "two per cent."

A. T. Cross of the Customs Department gave the official analysis showing the alcoholic content of the liquid, and F. W. Dawson, wholesale merchant, also gave evidence regarding the trade understanding.

After examining five or six witnesses the accused gave evidence on his own behalf, proving the case to the complete satisfaction of the prosecution. The charge being made under the Indian Act, which prohibits the supplying of alcohol in any proportion to Indians, was found proven by Judge Young, who imposed a penalty of \$50 with the alternative of three months at Okalla Prison Farm.

The accused was complimented upon his "placid conduct" of the case.
