The Army and Navy Veterans got away to a flying start last night when they elected officers and formally launched the local branch of the society with a charter membership of sixty. The meeting was held in the Court House, Major McMullin presiding. Officers were elected as follows: Hon. President, Lieut.-Col. C. W. Peck; president, J. H. McMullin; vice-president, G. A. Woodland; secretary-treasurer, Geo. Logan; executive, T. R. Johnson; Walter A. Adams, W. H. Murray, W. Mason, G. B. Robb, Michael Burke, and W. H. Derry; delegate to memorial site committee, G. A. Woodland.

The secretary was ordered to extend greetings to the Mayor and Council and to the Great War Veterans' Association. Short addresses which explained the aims and objects of the association were given by Major McMullin and T. H. Johnson and were much appreciated.

The veterans are now looking for new premises. They expect a very large membership as they will cover the whole of northern British Columbia, north of the 51st parallel, including Prince George and Anyox. Meetings will be held in their new premises on the first Monday in each month.

NINE MONTHS AT OKALLA FOR SELLING LIQUOR

Clarence Miller Found Guilty By Magistrate—Was Equally Guilty With Johnson Who Got Away.

In the police court this morning before Magistrate Carss Clarence Miller was convicted of selling whiskey and was sentenced to nine months' imprisonment at Okalla Prison Farm.

According to the evidence submitted, a barrel which was supposed to contain liquor was taken to the home of Madeline Myers on Comox Ave., and after being sampled was purchased for the sum of \$1,470 by Miss Myers and Blanch Harte, each paying \$735. Chiefly Water.

The liquor was purchased from two men, the prisoner and another man named Johnson, but the sale was arranged by Miller. After the whiskey had been delivered and the men gone it was found that the barrel contained mostly water, the whiskey having been contained in a small tin beneath the bung-hole.

Blanch Harte paid her share to Johnson, but Miss Myers paid Miller and then Johnson came up and grabbed the money and left. He seemed to be very nervous. He seemed to be very nervous.

H. Menzies of the Pacific Cartage told of having been hired to deliver the barrel which he got from a place on Ninth Avenue. Johnson accompanied him.

Miller giving evidence on his own behalf stated that he had been in and out of town occasionally for the last three years. He did not receive a cent out of the deal.

In giving judgment the magistrate expressed the opinion that both men were in the deal and both were equally guilty.

SOUNDINGS COMPLETE FOR BIG SLIP TO BE BUILT AT THIS PORT

Cars of Paper and Pulp Will Then Be Loaded at Factory and Transferred to Rails Here.

Soundings in preparation for the building of the marine slip on the waterfront have been completed and the work will be commenced very soon.

The slip is to be used for landing cars of pulp and paper for shipment east to do away with the expensive double handling at this port and to protect the product which is always more or less damaged every time it is moved.

The proposal is to load the paper on the cars right at the factory at Ocean Falls on the pulp at Swanson Bay and to tow the cars north on barges and transfer them to the rails here.

MERCHANTS APPEAL EARLY CLOSING CASE

The charge of infraction of the early closing bylaw recently brought up in the police court against Mrs. J. Hilditch was dismissed by the magistrate. An appeal will be made against this decision and a test case made before Judge Young by the merchants. They do not consider it is living up to the bylaw that some stores be allowed to remain open, while others have to be closed.

FISH ARRIVALS

Six fishing boats arrived in port this morning besides the two which came in yesterday. The Republic had a pretty good catch, bringing in 35,000 lbs. The others with smaller catches being the Zilla May with 18,000 lbs; the Siloam, 10,000; the Clara N., 7,000; the Ingred H., 1,500, and the Molly May with 4,000 lbs. The prices paid were as follows: For No. 4 from 13.70 cents to 14.10 cents and for No. 2 9.60 cents to 10 cents. These are rather low prices compared with what have been paid recently.

CHURCHES TO PRAY FOR BLESSINGS ON PEACE CONFERENCE

Bishop DuVernet has received an official copy of a "A Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor-General in Council" setting apart Sunday, the sixteenth day of February, as "a day of humble prayer; and intercession to Almighty God that His blessings may rest upon the Peace Conference, and that under His direction and guidance its deliberations and conclusions may result in the establishment of a world-wide peace on a just and permanent foundation; and we do invite all our loving subjects throughout Canada to observe the said day as solemnly set apart and consecrated for this purpose."

In addition to this the Federal War Service Commission, representing all the Churches, expresses the hope that the subject of repatriation and the problems connected with the return of our soldiers to civil life may be sympathetically presented to our church people on that day.
