#### Government Would Have Been Threatened But For Hoover's Speedy Action; More Injured

WASHINGTON, July 29:-General MacArthur, who took charge of the evacuation from Washington of bonus-seeking veterans.following yesterday's fatal riot, expressed his belief that the government would have been threatened had not President Herbert Hoover acted speedily in ordering out troops to take charge of the situation. Cavalry troops and steel-helmeted infantry from Fort Myers with fixed bayonets charged into the city after the first blood had been shed in the clash between veterans and police. More than fifty veterans, police, spectators and soldiers were injured in clashes which followed the arrival of the soldiers to force the evacuation of Anacostia Camp.

The army by today had smashed the grip which has been held on Washington for months past by thousands of veterans, demanding immediate payment of bonuses for war time services. As mute evidence of the struggle, four scarred areas now mark the once populous encampments of the bonus expeditionary force. The troops still remain in command.

The veterans were driven forth by tear gas and flaming torches were applied to their crude shelters clustered in small groups. The ex-soldiers headed from the city seeking to organize elsewhere.
