remier of France is Wounded

EMPT TO MURDER THE PREMIER OF FRANCE TODAY AS HE WAS ENTERING A CAR

BOY NAMED COTTIN FIRED EIGHT SHOTS WITH PISTOL, WOUNDING GEORGES CLEMENCEAU SLIGHTLY IN HIS RIGHT ARM

Paris, February 19.—Georges Clemenceau, Premier of France, was shot and slightly wounded by a boy named Cottin, as he ntered a motor car in front of his residence this morning.

The assailant who was arrested, refused to make any statement regarding the motive. He is about 18 years old, is a French ivilian, and is said to live in Compiegne.

As Clemenceau was seating himself in his limousine, Cottin uddenly sprang forward and fired eight shots from the pistol. ix of these hit the front of the car. Two bullets penetrated the lass door, one striking the Premier on the inner side of the ight arm near the shoulder, inflicting a flesh wound.
