Leader Wanted For Two Parties.

The death of Sir Wilfrid Laurier leaves an immense gap at the top of the Liberal ranks. There is no man at present in sight to step in and fill the place. W. S. Fielding, former minister of finance in the Laurier Government, will take charge temporarily, but he is too old a man to enthuse the young men in the Liberal ranks and to the young men the party must look for support. Old men are mostly Conservatives.

Because of the efficient way in which Sir Wilfrid filled the position of leader of the opposition there has been no other man come to the front in such a manner as to appeal to the imagination of the rank and file of the party. Mackenzie King has been spoken of as a possibility and Senator Robertson, Walter Scott, George P. Graham and others. Graham has been a good man, but he is too old. A young man is needed. Who will it be?

A similar condition arises in the Union camp. Sir Robert Borden is expected to go to Washington as British Ambassador and Sir Thomas White is generally expected to be his successor. Sir Thomas stands for intense conservatism. He is a man with a finger in every big financial pie in the country. His views and those of the rank and file are as wide apart as the poles. The Liberals in the cabinet could not follow Sir Thomas without cutting themselves off irretrievably from the Liberal party, something which they have not yet done. Those who are a long way from the seat of Government and are out of touch with the leaders and not entangled with the political wires are watching events with great interest and not without some anxiety. Good government is what is needed and to get it there must be strong leaders with righteous politics and a large enough following to carry through.

More Pep is What We Need.

What we need is more "pep." We need it in our business and in our work. We need it in our play. Pep is the thing which makes the lambs gambol with glee, the colts prance with joy, the calves throw up their tails and run like fury, the birds sing in split-throat notes, the frogs croak upon the creek bank, the insects buzz and hum in the air, the milkman whistle as he jogs along, the blacksmith laughingly beat the iron into shape, the plowman urge his horses with a "gee-up, there," the engineer wave a kiss to his sweetheart as he throws upon the throttle, the woodman smilingly plunge his axe into the giant tree, the banker and merchant rush to their work with a cheery "bye-bye," the mechanic and laborer fairly dance to their jobs, the soldier "go over the top" with clinched jaws and courage that knows no fear, the live salesman hie to his calls with shoulders squared, pride in his heart and nerves a-tingle with anticipation of new success.

Oh, "pep" is anything that puts happiness in the heart, energy in the body, determination in the soul, and invisible courage in the will.

Improved Terminals For Prince Rupert.

The general freight agent of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, who addressed the Board of Trade yesterday, spoke of the necessity of further improving the terminals here in order to cope with the increased business of the port. This is the sort of thing which gives everyone the feeling that the port is bound to develop. Business is making improvements necessary. The hands of the company are being forced and growth is bound to come.

Prince Rupert as the centre of so great a country and with everything ahead which makes for growth and prosperity is bound to grow and prosper. Even without any artificial stimulus from the introduction of big industries it would have to expand. With these other things in sight, however, and with a live Board of Trade that will go out for business, there is reason for optimism.
