nipeg in Optimistic Mood
Address Board of
Trade.

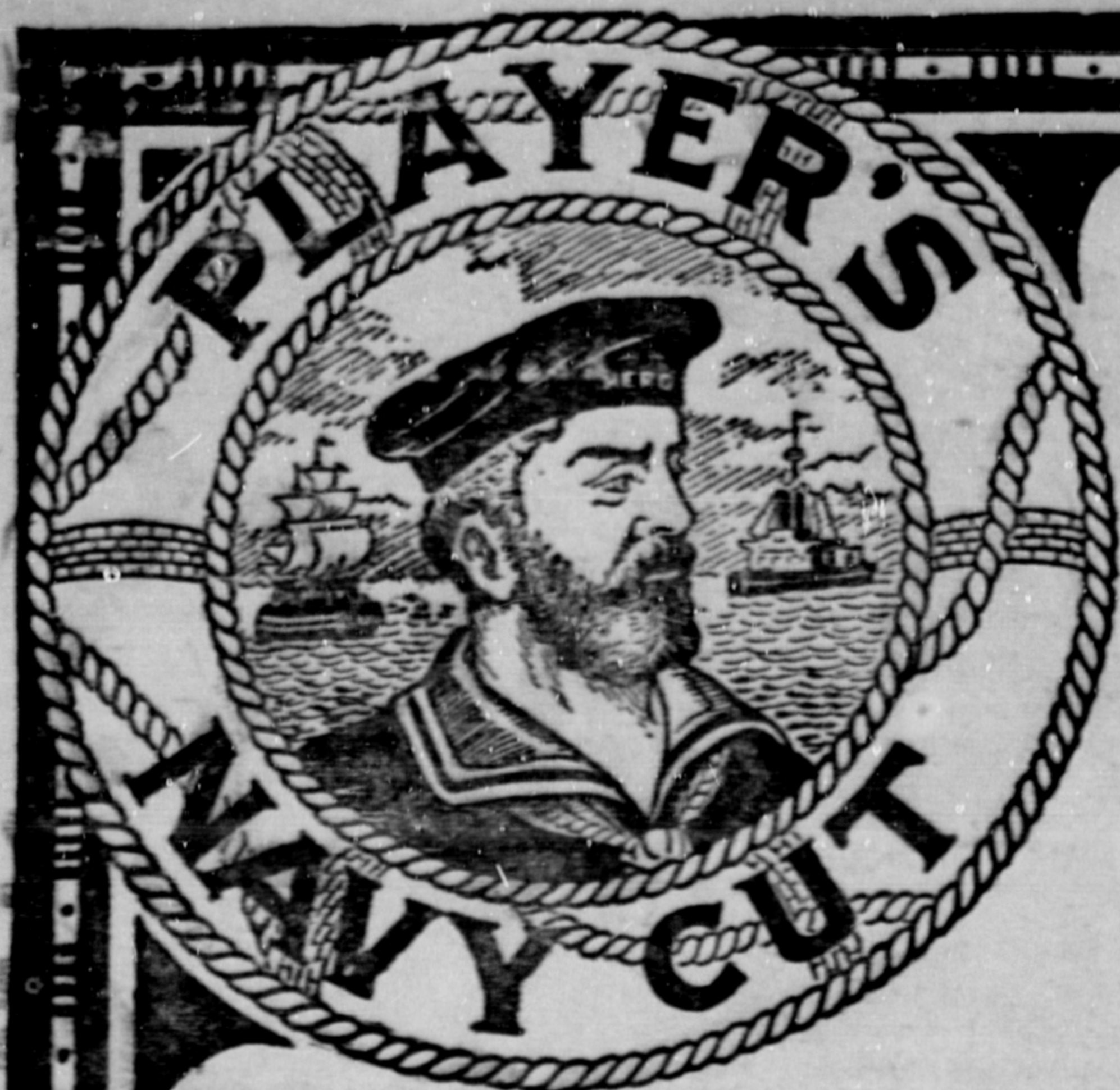
TELLS OF INCREASED
BUSINESS LAST YEAR

Doing Everything possible to De-
velop Port as Its Interests and
That of Railway are One.

The addresses of the Grand
Trunk Railway officials who were
here from Winnipeg and who ad-
dressed the Board of Trade in the
council chamber yesterday after-
noon, struck an optimistic note
regarding the future of this port.
The whole tone of their addresses
was a realization of the fact that
the interests of the city and rail-
way were one and that the growth
and prosperity of Prince Rupert
was just as important to the rail-
way as it was to the people living
here.

Market in Orient.

After speaking of the fine ad-
dress given by M. P. McCaffery at
the railwaymen's convention re-
cently in which the chairman of
the local Board of Trade put
Prince Rupert on the map so far
as the railway is concerned, A. E.
Rosevear, general freight agent
for the G. T. P., said that last
year was the biggest in the his-
tory of the railway in the matter
of revenue. They were doing
everything possible to develop
this port. They were looking to
the development of the fishing,
lumbering and mining and to the
creation of a market in the Orient.
Goods coming from the Orient
could be marketed quicker sent

this way than by any other route.
37 Per Cent. Increase.

Speaking of the business of the
railway had done in fish, the
speaker said that this year they
carried 37 per cent. more than
last and Alaska was looking to
Prince Rupert as the route by
which the fish could get on the
market quickly. The object of
his visit just now was to look over
the sheds and terminals and
make recommendations in regard
to extensions. They intended to
put Rupert on the map as much
as possible.

Visited Anyox.

The party had just visited Any-
ox and gone over that marvellous
mine and smelter. He thought
they should use this port more
than they had been doing. He had
seen the officials there and they
had promised to use this port
more than they had been doing.
He had also gone through the
paper mills at Ocean Falls and
the thing that struck him was

and pulp mill close to Prince Ru-
pert. Also he could not see why
there should not be a smelter
here. There should be contingent

Mr. Duperow Speaks.

W. E. Duperow, general pas-
senger agent at Winnipeg spoke
of the friendship and hospitality
which had been extended to them

here. In all his experience he had

vention he thought he would
never stop talking. He boosted
Prince Rupert to the limit.

24 Joined Colors.

War conditions had made it
impossible for them to visit Ru-
pert before. From his office alone
24 men had joined for active ser-
vice and they were not conscripts.

Speaking of the service for the
coming year, Mr. Duperow said
that Prince Rupert would be fea-
tured as heretofore not only in
Canada but throughout the States
where the tourist traffic came
from. They had, as an experi-
ment, arranged circuit tours last
year and as a result about a thou-
sand people had taken advantage
of the route last season. This
was more or less missionary
work.

At the conclusion of the meet-
ing some questions were asked
and answered and the visitors
were thanked for their addresses.
E. A. Wakefield also gave an in-
teresting address.
