## Copper Market Not Encouraging.

Word comes from Anyox that commencing tomorrow morning there will be a general reduction of wages and with it there is a reduction in the price of board at the company's mess house.

While everyone regrets that a reduction of wages should have been found necessary it was inevitable that something would be done before long. The company might have carried on another month or two and lost some money, paying it out of their former profits, but that would not have helped much. Copper has dropped from around thirty cents a pound to sixteen cents and there is plenty on hand so that it is not improbable the commodity may go even lower.

The men will resent the drop in wages and many will leave, but just what the company could have done under the circumstances no one can suggest. The tendency is downwards and nothing is likely to stop it so far as can be seen. In Vancouver there are thousands of men walking the streets out of employment and everywhere there is a sufficiency of labor.

## Important Congress Sitting in London.

Great things are expected from the Congress now sitting in London for the purpose of having employers and employees discuss subjects which are of mutual interest. This is the first together gathering of any consequence that has been held and on its success or failure hangs the industrial fate of the United Kingdom. That it will at any rate be the beginning of a better understanding between employers and employees seems likely.

## Civil Servants Express Opinions.

It is to be sincerely hoped that a wise and far-seeing vision will distinguish the attitude of the leaders in our Government in dealing with economic and social problems arising out of the war, says "The Civilian," the official organ of the civil servants of Canada. A seismic tremor is disturbing the atmosphere of all countries affected by the war and it will be but a dull politician who will misinterpret the signs of the impending earthquake. On account of our economic oligarchy, Canada is but ill-prepared to deal with events even now in course of development. At one Labor Bureau in the city of Toronto, 397 discharged soldiers enrolled for employment in two weeks and this no doubt means that a great many more are actually out of work. "Some of the men who applied were hungry and some have walked as far as twenty miles in one day to get work," says a report from Toronto. The Hon. Mr. Rowell appears to see the momentous problem arising and it is to be hoped he will convert the Hon. Mr. Maclean or any others of his colleagues who may be disposed to view lightly the economic enigma confronting us. The laboring class have made its sacrifices in the war, it is now becoming that the privileged politico-economic class do likewise. Idealistic expressions will not meet the situation. Action swift and sure and radical is called for on the part of those who at present control the destinies of Canada.

## Air Travel is Come to Stay.

There is now no doubt that air travel has come to stay. It was inevitable but war has proved a great stimulus to the development of the science of aeronautics.

The public will probably learn by future experience that aerial travel at no matter what high speed is really less dangerous than motor car travelling at the relatively low speed of 50 miles per hour. The slightest neglect or inattention on the part of a chauffeur may result in a terrible road collision, whereas a pilot of an aëronaut has no such danger to fear. For him the really critical moment is the landing, but in the case of modern passenger aërons this difficulty has been reduced to a minimum by the reduction of speed, extra strong landing chassis, and very powerful brakes. Even the large type of machine with a full load alights gently on the ground at the low speed of 37 miles per hour.
