## UNITE TO PAY TRIBUTE OF RESPECT TO THE MEMORY OF SIR WILFRID LAURIER

POLITICS FORGOTTEN AND MEN OF ALL SHADES OF OPINION FORGATHER AT WESTHOLME TO HONOR MEMORY OF CANADA'S GREAT-EST SON

A sincere tribute was paid to the late Sir Wilfrid Laurier at the Westholme Theatre yesterday when men and women of all shades of politics gathered to bear witness to his greatness. Mayor McClymont presided and the other speakers were Rev. Canon Rix, Rev. H. R. Grant, O. H. Nelson, E. A. Wakefield and Fred Stork. Politics was forgotten in the realization of the loss of a nation had suffered in the death of so great a man.

Mayor McClymont in introducing the speakers spoke of the fact that it was the work of the late Laurier that made it possible for Prince Rupert to be on the map through the building of the transcontinental railway. The country had not produced any great statesmen, but the late Sir John A. Macdonald and late Sir Wilfrid Laurier stood prominently. One was a Canadian by adoption and the other by birth.

**Most Eloquent Son.**  
O. H. Nelson said that in the life of Sir Wilfrid Canada had lost her most eloquent son. He took pleasure in appearing at that evening to pay a tribute to the memory of so great a man, and spoke of the growth of his influence in the country and of how early he had got to the very hearts of the people.

In his speeches he had mentioned the differences in nationalities (continued on Page Four.)

## TWO BURGLARIES SINCE SATURDAY

Victory Bonds Stolen from James Currie's Bakery and Clothes from Pantorium.

Five hundred dollars in negotiable victory bonds and receipts for two hundred additional were stolen from the James Currie bakery on Saturday night or Sunday morning. When the plumber arrived on Sunday at 8 a. m., he found the door open and it was later discovered that the bonds were missing. A number of other papers were taken but only about a dollar and a half in cash was secured. The door had apparently been opened with a pass key.

Another place which was entered in a similar way was the Pantorium on Sixth Street where two suits and overcoats were stolen. In this case there was a man sleeping in a rear apartment at the time the goods were taken.

## GERMAN ARMY IS TO BE REDUCED TO TWO HUNDRED THOUSAND MEN

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, March 3.—General Foch has presented to the Council of Great Powers the military terms of the peace treaty. It provides for the disarmament of Germany to twenty divisions of ten thousand men each, including fifteen divisions of infantry and five of cavalry.

Severe restrictions are placed on the manufacture of all classes of war materials and the military and commercial use of airplanes is limited.

## MEN RETURNING AT SEATTLE SOLDIERS ARE COMING HOME

Five Hundred Metal Workmen Return; 6000 Locked Out at San Francisco. Still 18,000 Wounded Overseas; General Burstall Tells of Movements of Troops.

San Francisco, March 3.—Six thousand machinists and shipyard laborers were locked out for refusing to work Saturday afternoon.

Seattle, March 3.—Five hundred metal workers and helpers on ship contracts who have been on strike returned to work at the same pay as before the strike.

## ROCHER DE BOULE MAY RE-OPEN SOON

The Rocher de Boule mine which was closed last autumn may re-open soon, according to the people who live in that neighborhood. A generator which had been sent south for repairs has been returned to the mine and it is expected that a mill will be installed to treat the low-grade ores. If this occurs it is probable that there will be great activity at the mine as well as at the adjoining properties.

## NEW ZEALAND IS SPENDING MONEY

Reconstruction plans in New Zealand provide for a Government expenditure of over \$12,000,000 on public works, including extensive railroad and highway construction. Initial work will be started on the Dominion's \$65,000,000 hydro-electric development program. Fifteen hundred thousand dollars will be devoted to new public schools, and it is proposed to organize schools of agricultural instruction for returned soldiers.

Large sums will likely be spent on reclamation and drainage of swamp lands for grazing purposes. The United States Consul at Auckland, New Zealand, has reported that all these undertakings will call for more or less machinery, tools and structural material, and that it would seem wise for American interests to put themselves in a position to supply these needs, especially as far as railway material, farm implements and dredging machinery are concerned.

## GERMANY PARTIALLY RECOGNIZES SOVIETS

Berlin, March 3.—The German Government has agreed to partially recognize the Soviets in the frantic effort to prevent the strikes becoming a nation-wide revolution.
