Monday Preachment To the Flock.

The people of Prince Rupert have cause to thank themselves that they are not as other men are. They have no poor among them. If there are any, nobody seems to know it.

As at other places the people are divided into many social sets, each enjoying life in its own particular way. There are rounds of social events among the permanent residents and now and then all meet at a public dance or gathering of some kind and there is more or less intermingling.

With all the relaxation and recreation there is a danger that those who are more fortunately placed will forget that there are always a number of new arrivals in the city, and others who have not the facilities for enjoyment that are possessed by those who are "in the swim." For these there is the appeal of the billiard room, the cabaret, and that is about all. It is a difficult position.

In dealing with matters of this sort often what we lack is knowledge. Social distinctions tend toward isolation of those who are on the outside and this drives them to seek company where they would not from choice.

Man is a sociable animal. He has to have the company of his fellows in order to exist normally. Those who have everything in the way of money and friends might well devote a little attention to those who are without. That is good missionary work. In a town like this it is worth thinking about.

No Standing Still; Progress or Failure.

Any system that fails to take account of human progress is a failure before it begins. Any person who fails to improve is a failure no matter how prominent he may be. Lenore Ulric, the actress, is reported to have said: "On the stage you've got to be satisfied that you can do anything, but never satisfied with anything you do." That is the secret of success. To quote further from the same young lady, as reported in the American Magazine for March, she says:

"On the stage you've got to be satisfied that you can do anything, but never satisfied with anything you do. The statement, of course, requires qualification. While being sure of ability, you must be modest too, I think, I don't mean meek and shrinking and self-distrustful. That is just what I don't mean. One has to be confident—quietly, steadily, buoyantly confident. Not conceited. No. That's different. To be conceited is to be satisfied—satisfied with what you have done. And to be satisfied with what you have done is never to do better. But confidence is, oh, such an indispensable asset! Lack of confidence never gets you past a manager's office boy, no matter how capable you are.

"I am never satisfied with my acting. Never. From the day of the first rehearsal I keep building my part. I'm never content to conclude that I'm getting as much out of it as possible. I could tell you of a thousand little things I've added to the role of 'Tiger Rose' since the opening night. I just keep molding and molding and molding it into better shape. And so, no matter how many times I play a part, it never gets tiresome or uninteresting—because, by keeping it growing always, I keep it always new."

Board of Trade Will Meet City Council.

It is expected that a delegation from the Board of Trade consisting of the chairmen of the various committees will meet the City Council tonight with a view to securing some help in carrying on the work during the coming year. Sending a special delegate to the Mining Convention to represent the city and district with a view to bringing the mining resources of the district before the mining men who will be there, costs a good deal, and there are many other similar things to be done. The board will easily raise a thousand dollars or more from its members, but more than that will be needed if the publicity and other work is to be properly carried on. It will be the business of the committees to show that the money is needed and that the work will be of benefit to the city as a whole, before they can expect to be given a grant. If they can do that, and doubtless they can, a grant would seem to be money well spent. The city must make her presence felt everywhere throughout the province, and the country at large.
