sale was made according to the meaning of the act.

Application Refused.
Judge Young refused to grant the application for dismissal on the ground that the agreement was to sell whiskey and there was no doubt but there was some whiskey in the barrel. They paid for the sample as well as the rest for they bought 42 gallons. The judge said he could not appreciate so fine a distinction as Mr. McInnes would make.

Prisoner's Story.
Prisoner, giving evidence on his own behalf, said that he was an engineer. He had met Johnson on the boat coming north and later had been invited to his room in the Prince Rupert hotel where he had been given whiskey by Johnson and had got drunk. Another day Johnson had told him he had some liquor coming from Vancouver, which he was trying to dispose of. Johnson mentioned Miss Blanche Hart and as witness knew her the outcome was that they went off together but Johnson turned back and left him to go in alone. He told Miss Hart that a friend of his had the liquor to sell.

On the following day after the delivery of the barrel and when Johnson had left, he went away with the teamster who had another barrel with him. He and the teamster tried to get some whisky out of this barrel but they found it to be only water.

Mr. McInnes then renewed his application for dismissal, which was refused by the judge.

MEMBERS WOULD RAISE SESSIONAL INDEMNITY

Ottawa, March 6. — There is a movement on foot among the members of the House of Commons to have the sessional indemnity increased from \$2500 to \$3000 per annum, and it is understood that the matter was mentioned at the first government caucus of the session held today. Members claim that with the cost of living doubled throughout the country and accentuated at the capital for temporary residents by the shortage of accommodation, they are unable, if a session is prolonged, "to make both ends meet." There is no intimation as yet as to how the government will view the proposal.

In this connection, it is pointed out in parliamentary circles that while the indemnity of members has been gradually advanced from \$1000 to \$2500 the pay of ministers of the crown had remained stationary at \$7500 per annum.

In reply to a question asked in the legislature by the member for Prince George, Hon. T. D. Pattullo gave the following information: On January 2, 1917, there were 2,740,123 acres of land held under uncompleted agreements and of this 39,517 had been applied for under the Soldiers' Homestead Act, 2,207,994 acres had reverted to the Crown. There are now no lands, the purchase of which is uncompleted, and no money due the Government on account of such land purchases.
