We want for administrators something better than men who have devoted their lives to enriching themselves with a modicum of the surplus wealth turned over to charity.

People of Northern and Central B.C. are watching developments at Victoria with great interest with the nope that a government will be formed that will be representative of the mass of the people and not of the chosen few.

### POINT TO REMEMBER


