## ACTIVITY AT LUMBER MILLS NEAR FUTURE

Kelly Company and Ocean Falls Divide Logs on South Islands; Other Activities.

The Kelly Logging Co., whose headquarters are at Atli Inlet, Moresby Island, have bought the logs in the woods south of Skidegate, amounting to something like 35,000,000 feet in all and will at once commence getting them into the water. T. A. Kelley went to the islands last night. The remainder of the logs south of Skidegate, about 40,000,000 feet, have been sold to the Ocean Falls paper mill and will be ground into newsprint and craft paper. That disposes of the logs on Moresby Island.

A number of men went across to Masset last night to commence getting the mills in shape for opening before long. There is a rumor that the Buckley mills have made a deal for most of the logs at Masset Inlet, but this is not confirmed and there is a general opinion that the logs will be distributed among the mills on the Inlet.

There is no definite news yet in regard to the starting up of the Prince Rupert mill, but it is hoped that arrangements will be made for a supply of logs so that work may commence very soon.

### GOVERNMENT WILL NOT LIKELY TAKE THE G. T. P.

had previously made what they thought was a fair offer and stood by this offer. The Government then notified the Grand Trunk that it could not advance any further loans and that the Grand Trunk would have to shoulder the responsibility for the G. T. P. Doubt has been expressed as to the ability of the parent company to meet these obligations, but the money has been found and the company apparently does not propose to accept the Government's offer.

### Expropriation Only Course.

The Government and the company being unable to agree to term of sale the only alternative is expropriation which has been advocated in certain quarters. The difficulty with expropriation is that a large section of the Grand Trunk lies in the United States and Canada has no authority to expropriate property outside of the Dominion. If the lines in Canada were expropriated alone, the country would be acquiring a road without head or tail, as the terminals of the Grand Trunk are respectively in Chicago and Portland. The road would be of minor value without these connections and terminals. This is the situation and under the circumstances the hands of the Government are apparently tied until the Grand Trunk directors are prepared to negotiate on a basis which the Government thinks fair or the company gets tired of footing the bills of the Grand Trunk Pacific.
