MR. BOWSER AND MR. PATTULLO AT GRIPS

Discussion Regarding Timber at Masset Inlet Provides House With Diversion.

In explanation of his motion calling for the appointment of a select committee to investigate the standing of the claim of one James Adams to indemnity for timber cut from Lot 1497, being an island in Masset Inlet, the Leader of the Opposition maintained that a gross injustice had been done the man who held title to the land. He went into the matter in detail, claiming that the Government had assured Mr. Adams that his title was being put through and would be forthcoming in due time, says the Victoria Daily Times. Then a permit was issued to Morgan and Company to log aeroplane spruce off the property, and no income was secured by Mr. Adams.

Explained.

The Minister of Lands promptly explained that Mr. Adams had applied for the land in the first place as farmland, which meant that he claimed the property did not bear timber in excess of 8,000 feet to the acre. The land actually was proven to be timber land and it was found that the timber ran 14,000 feet to the acre. This, he said, made Adam's claim to the property null and void, and that in no case was the claimant entitled to revenue from the sale of the timber. If Adams claimed that the land was not timber land when he staked it, then why did the Leader of the Opposition wish to secure indemnity when none was due?

Pattullo Smiled.

Mr. Pattullo smiled at the make-up of the proposed Select Committee. Mr. Bowser had included his own name, and the Minister of Lands thought perhaps the Leader of the Opposition was desirous of acting as prosecuting attorney in explaining the motion.

References had been made to the part played by Mr. Williams, of Williams and Manson, in securing an option, and the Minister of Lands suggested that the Leader of the Opposition was more desirous of "taking a crack" at the Minister of Lands and Mr. Manson, a member of the Government party, than he was in securing an indemnity for Mr. Adams.

W. R. Ross, K. C., member for Fort George, moved the adjournment of the debate.

W. G. Ludgate, manager of the Kitsumkalum Timber Company's saw mill at Zimacord, B. C., accompanied by A. Ludgate, manager of the logging department of the same company, arrived in the city last night on business. He reports that work on the mill has recommenced. USE OF MOTOR BOATS

Editor News:—

A copy of the U. S. Motor Boat laws have been forwarded to Ottawa with the following additional recommendations:

The first law of boating has always been never to leave anyone marooned or in distress. It with the traditions of the sea would be much more in keeping to punish a boatman for not carrying people through this country.

In addition to the U. S. regulations a row boat of 35 cu. ft. capacity to be towed or carried.

Also a life raft such as our regulations now call for on a boat under 40 ft. in length. This raft is a metal life preserver always on deck and should be required on all passenger boats of class two and three.

In any case where a man knowingly hires an unlicensed boat, and the boat is fined, a like amount shall be assessed against such man.

SHIPBUILDING

Glyde Man Tells How Work is Done in American Yards.

We read a great deal about the shipbuilding progress which is being made in America and the short time in which ships are being produced, and we are asked how this is possible, says an article by a Clyde shipbuilder in the Glasgow Herald. One reply is that the method which they adopt in shipbuilding and the preparing of material in America is quite different from that followed in this country. They make moulds and distribute them to different parts of the country to be manufactured. All the works which have been engaged in bridge-building or similar work get a part of the ship to prepare, and they are asked to repeat this for a number of vessels. One firm may prepare the transverse frames, one the double bottom, one the tank top, one the beams of the ship, one the longitudinal, one the bulkhead plates, and one the deck plates, and so on. This work is all prepared off templates, and is given out as repeat orders.

The men are accustomed to all this work and to the hustle which is put on at the different works so as to facilitate the shipyards taking in a great quantity of material in a very short time. In many of these places they work 24 hours per day—three shifts of eight hours. When the material arrives at the shipyards it is erected by gangs of men, or teams—one leading man and the remainder assistants. Each of the teams is paid either a lump sum for the erecting of certain sections or a fixed rate of wages. The appliances for lifting the material are such that they are able to build into the vessel hundreds of tons per day, and the moment the sections are prepared the pneumatic riveters are engaged in large numbers putting them together, so that, if a fair comparison of time is to be made, it ought to be based on the number of hours and workmen engaged on the production of that ship—not in the shipyard alone but in the various works which are engaged in preparing the material until it is erected and riveted and the ship launched.
