GEORGE CASEY IS ELECTED LOCAL VICE-PRESIDENT BY B. C. FEDERATION OF LABOR

CALGARY MEETING MAKES CHOICE WITHOUT BALLOT—J. KAVANAGH IS PRESIDENT FOR COMING YEAR; RECORD OF PRINCE RUPERT'S REPRESENTATIVE

Calgary, March 13.—With a plurality of five votes over his opponent, J. Kavanagh was elected president of the British Columbia Federation of Labor. For vice-presidents there were elected P. McDonald of the Machinists' Union, and W. H. Cotter of the Street and Electric Railwaymen's Union, both of Vancouver; J. Taylor, longshoreman, was elected for Victoria; J. Taylor for Vancouver Island, G. D. McMurphy for New Westminster, T. Roberts for Kootenay and the Boundary, W. P. Phillips for the Crows Nest Pass and George Casey for Prince Rupert, all by acclamation. Victoria is selected as the next convention city.

PRINT BUREAU MAY BE CLOSED

Announcement Made. By Hon. Martin Burrell in House of Commons Yesterday.

Ottawa, March 13.—Apparently endless debate on the address dragged along another four hours in the House of Commons yesterday after having been temporarily terminated the previous night by lack of a quorum. The debate has now occupied eleven days with the prospect of running at least two days more. Hon. W. S. Fielding is to speak. The speakers yesterday were Thomas Foster, Edmond Savard, F. B. Stacey, Dr. Fontaine and W. C. McGuirrie.

UNITED STATES MAY ASSUME CONTROL OF WASHINGTON FISH

Treaty with Canada Held Up Owing to Opposition of Austrian Seiners.

Seattle, March 13.—The indications are that the Federal Government of the United States will assume the administration of the sockeye fishing in the State of Washington following the failure of the State Legislature to take action in restricting salmon fishing to conform with the provisions provided under the international fisheries treaty with Canada, incorporation of which into the state laws was defeated owing to opposition of Austrian purse seiners and other fishing interests.

BUDGET SHOWS EXPENDITURE \$13,313,303

Introduced Into Legislature Today by Hon. John Hart, Minister of Finance.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Victoria, March 13.—Hon. John Hart, Minister of Finance, today made his budget speech and tabled the estimates for the coming year. The budget for the years 1919-1920 shows that there are proposed expenditures amounting to \$13,313,303, while the estimated revenue for the year is only \$10,209,960.

The large expenditure is made necessary by the desire of the Government to tide over the abnormal time following the close of the war. Reference was made by Mr. Hart to the success of the recent loan and the high credit of the province, the latter having recovered under the present administration.

LABOR MEN DO NOT WANT BARS

Six-Hour Day Will Be Discussed At Calgary and Prohibition on Cards.

Calgary, March 13.—At the Western Canada Labor Congress the biggest question to come up is the six-hour day proposal and it is almost certain that the liquor question will be aired, although, to quote a delegate at the British Columbia Federation convention here, "any resolution that will call for resumption in any way of the liquor trade will be squashed flat."

SECRET TREATY BETWEEN CHINA AND JAPANESE

Evidence Given By Immigration Agent Tells of Finding Copies of Document.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Vancouver, March 13.—In the Police Court proceedings against Doctor Chen Shue Yen, head of the Chinese Nationalist League, who is charged with being a member of an unlawful organization, Capt. Malcolm Reid of the Canadian Immigration Service, testified to finding in Vancouver copies of the secret treaties between China and Japan stolen from Chinese delegates crossing Japan enroute to the peace conference. Doctor Yen would not answer question as to how they came to Vancouver.

CIVIL SERVICE IS EXTENSIVE

Total Number Employed in Canada in April Last Year Was 54,619.

Ottawa, March 13.—The civil service list tabled in the House of Commons today includes a statement showing the numerical strength on April 1, 1918, in addition to 4,147 employees permanent in the inside service and 18,593 in the permanent outside service, there were 6,234 temporary outside employees, a total of 41,619. To these figures must be added 13,000 rural postmasters under the jurisdiction of the Civil Service Commission, a grand total of 54,619 in the civil service of Canada.

PRINCE RUPERT HAS HALF THE CLUBS IN THE WHOLE PROVINCE

In answer to questions by W. J. Bowser, Mr. Farris reported to the Legislature that of twelve clubs incorporated as public companies under the Companies Act six were in Prince Rupert, one at Port Essington and one at Prince George. No applications had been refused, as they all complied with the provisions of the law, but one had been dissolved by order in council.

ASSASSINATION OF FERDINAND WAS PLOT OF THE HUNGARIAN PREMIER

Berne, March 13.—Charges that the assassination of Archduke Francis Ferdinand and his wife, the Duchess of Hohenberg, at Sarajevo June 28, 1914, was the result of a deliberate plot by the late Count Tisza, Hungarian premier, are made in a pamphlet written by a priest who was the spiritual adviser of the Duchess of Hohenberg, according to a Vienna dispatch to the Frankfort Gazette.

The general idea of the pamphlets is that Magyar magnates, with the consent of the Vienna court, wished to get rid of the Archduke, who was extremely disliked and to obtain vengeance for the murder at the expense of the Jugo Slavs. He pointed out no "proper" inquiry had ever been made into the tragedy.

LARGE CATCH OF HELGOLAND

Independent Schooner Gets 105,000 lbs. of Halibut, Arriving Just Before noon Today.

The independent fishing boat Helgoland arrived this morning with the record catch of 105,000 lbs. She was out about two weeks and it was not expected that she would exceed her usual catch of fifty or sixty thousand pounds of halibut.

There were two other catches put up for sale today, that of the Tatoosh with 12,000 lbs. and the Madeline J. also with 12,000 lbs. of halibut. The Tatoosh fished along the west coast in about 120 fathoms of water, while the Madeline J. fished in Hecate Straits.

The catch of the Helgoland was purchased by the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. at 11.5c. and 8c. a pound. The rest of the fish fetched 13.5c. and 16c.

MANY MEN ARRIVE HERE FROM ANYOX ON STEAMER VENTURE

The Union Steamship Venture arrived last night from Anyox, bringing in a great many men who are leaving that camp following the general shut down of the work. Instead of going on south, as most of them would naturally have done, they are here today waiting for the work at the dock to start.

The boat sailed for the south at seven last night.

KIMMEL CAMP MEN ARE BEING ALL SENT HOME

Number of Big Troopships Carrying Soldiers to Halifax and More to Follow.

Halifax, March 13.—As a result of the riot of the Canadian troops at Kimmel camp, arrangements have been made to use again the big troopships in the Canadian service. The steamer Baltic has left Liverpool with over 3,000 men and the Carmania is on the way with nearly 3,000, while the White Star liner Olympic is scheduled to sail from Liverpool on Saturday with 5,000 Canadian troops. All three ships are coming to this port.

It is expected that all the men at Kimmel camp will be back in Canada by the end of the month.

The agent of the Union Steamship Company here reports that the Venture will arrive in Prince Rupert next week one day late.
