Permanent Committee On Capital and Labor.

Human rights of labor and the principle of collective bargaining have been recognized in Italy as they are being recognized in Great Britain and the United States. Capt. Angelo Fanelli, a member of the Italian Military Mission now in the United States, is the authority for the statement that only one serious strike has occurred in Italy since the signing of the armistice.

"Three months ago," he says, "a very satisfactory agreement was arrived at between the industrial leaders of the country and representatives of the labor unions. The negotiations resulted in the formation of a permanent committee on which capital and labor are both represented. The Committee has its headquarters in Milan and is working earnestly to adjust all labor questions as they arise. A strong point in the situation is that the manufacturers have agreed with labor upon a system of profit-sharing. This system has been legalized by special law. These compacts between capital and labor are enabling Italian industry to develop to a remarkable degree its technical and financial side."

Relationship Between Capital and Labor.

The President of the Trades and Labor Council at Vancouver in giving evidence before a commission a few days ago declared that there could be no co-operation between capital and labor for the two were always opposed. Nothing could reconcile them. If the men were given what they demanded today they would ask more tomorrow and the only way in which the disputes could be settled was to give labor everything it asked.

The above is a summary of the statements made in answer to questions. It indicates the frame of mind of a few individuals who often get to the front and pose as labor leaders. Happily the statements are not true in regard to the great mass of sensible workingmen who realize that the time has not come when it would be possible for the industries of the world to proceed automatically without any recognized heads and without organization. The men who have charge are not usually there because they have money, for often they have little, but because they are especially fitted to organize and carry on the work.

In Russia they are proving that it is impossible to carry on without using the best brains of the country for organization. The work is too big for the average man. In this country or any other if there is to be anything approaching industrial socialism all the best heads of the country will have to be enlisted in the movement. It will be done by means of co-operation and not by opposition. Capital and labor will gradually merge, and it will probably be by making every man a capitalist and not by destroying capital.

Government Printing Is Not a Success.

A commission has just reported on the Government Printing Office at Ottawa to the effect that the men employed there are not giving value for what they receive and that commercially speaking the work done there is a failure.

A similar claim has often been made in regard to the printing office at Victoria. It is costing too much. This means that the men employed do not all give a fair day's work for a fair day's wages. There is too much killing time, or at any rate there has been too much of it in the past, whatever the condition may be just now.

It is a curious fact that otherwise good and honest men do not feel obliged to give value in labor when working for a government. They are always ready to steal the time which does not belong to them, but which they have sold to the people as a whole as represented by the Government.
