**STATE OF WASHINGTON RESPONSIBLE IF THERE IS NO FISH PROTECTION**

Whether a treaty is signed between the United States and Canada for the protection and replenishment of sockeye salmon in Puget Sound and British Columbia waters depends largely on action that may be taken in the last days of the State Legislature at Olympia, says State Fish Commissioner L. H. Darwin.

So far nothing has been done in regard to recommendations of the United States and Canadian Governments that have been forwarded to Olympia in regard to the protection of sockeye salmon.

The proposed federal regulations are the result of the work of joint American-Canadian commission which met in Seattle last year, the American commissioners being headed by Secretary of Commerce Redfield.

Similar proposed regulations will be submitted to the executive bodies of British Columbia, and if both the state of Washington and British Columbia adopt the regulations a treaty will be signed between the United States and Canada, said Mr. Darwin. It is doubtful, however, if the state of Washington fails to take action anything can be done by the United States and Canadian Governments toward regulating the sockeye fisheries, it was said in Seattle today.

Unless drastic action is taken the sockeye salmon are threatened with almost complete elimination, according to the Federal report.

The proposed Federal regulations afford a medium for joint action between Washington and British Columbia, whereas if action is taken merely by the State of Washington alone, it is said, very little protection will be afforded the sockeye salmon, which have their origin in the Fraser River of British Columbia.
